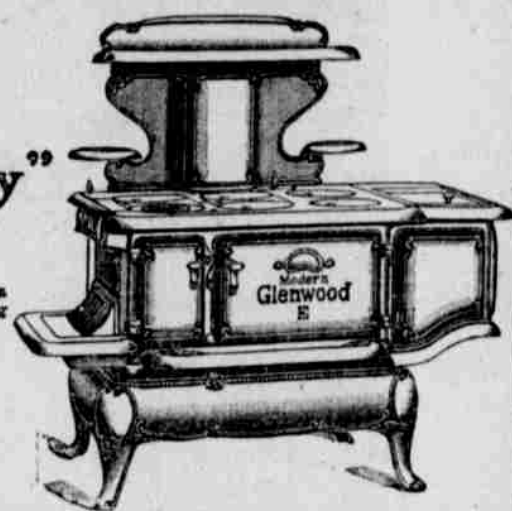

SUFFRAGE MUST WAIT

President Will Not Include It In Mes-
sage—To Refer To Tariff Only.

Washington, March 20.—President Wilson will not include in his message to the coming extraordinary session of Congress a clause recommending legislation for a constitutional amendment granting votes for women. This became de-

nitely certain yesterday. The president will ignore requests that he recommend legislation for currency reform and many other issues. His single recommendation will be for expedition of tariff revision legislation.

Although no official announcement to this effect was made yesterday, it became definitely known that the president wants the extra session to take up tariff only.

POLICE SILENCE

ADMIRAL'S STEP- DAUGHTER

Girl Willing To Tell How Eaton Died,
But Is Prevented—Declares It
Was Accident.

Rockland, Mass., March 20.—The cause of the death of Rear Admiral Joseph G. Eaton, U. S. A., retired, was neither murder nor suicide, according to Miss Dorothy Ainsworth, daughter of Mrs. Eaton by a former marriage. Miss Ainsworth was in Rockland for a brief time on an errand. When asked about her stepfather's death, which the county authorities are investigating, she said: "There is no mystery in the cause of the death of Admiral Eaton. I know just what it is. It is not murder; it is not suicide."

Asked if it was an accident, she said: "I can't say any more. There is no mystery about it. The officials know what the cause is. I wish I could say more, but I can't."

The search for evidence took officers to Boston, where an effort was made to find what occasioned the visit to that city of Miss Ainsworth on March 8, the day following his sudden demise.

District Attorney A. F. Barker admitted that an attempt was being made to go deeper in the history of the Eaton family.

DOW IS GIVEN FROM 8 TO 12 YEARS

Epker, Accused of Larceny, Sentenced
To State Prison By Judge
Brown.

Boston, March 20.—Stephen R. Dow, head of the S. R. Dow & company, brokers, was sentenced to eight to twelve years in state prison by Judge Brown in the Suffolk superior court yesterday, and a stay was allowed, in which the attorneys, Frank Paul and Fred H. Williams, will file exceptions with the supreme court.

Mr. Paul, in his argument to the court, said that the defendant was found guilty of precisely the same acts for which he was found not guilty.

Dow was indicted by the grand jury on the charge of larceny in ninety-two counts, aggregating a sum of over \$300,000. When he was found guilty on twenty-four of twenty-five charges, the amount of money involved was reduced to a little more than \$250,000.

NOTES ON NATIONAL POLITICS

Brief Bits of News and Comment on
Men and Measures.

Governor Haines of Maine has vetoed the act to increase the salary of the judge of the superior court of Kennebec county from \$2,700 to \$4,000 a year and to give the judge of that court jurisdiction in murder cases.

President Wilson has received a "big stick"—a shillelah of Irish blackthorn and was tied with a green ribbon.

The Maine Senate has passed to be engrossed the bill for the creation of a public utilities commission and to define its duties.

The Minnesota initiative and referendum bills were made ready for the governor's signature by the former's passage in the House and the latter's passage by the Senate.

The New Jersey Senate has passed the Davis jury commission bill in the form desired by President Wilson. The bill provides for the appointment of two jury commissioners in each county by the governor and provides the manner of selecting grand and petit jurors by lot.

The Missouri House has passed a bill prohibiting the sale of cigarettes in that state after Jan. 1, 1914. The bill passed by a vote of 75 to 47.

Opportunity to decide whether the initiative, referendum and recall propositions shall be incorporated in the constitution of Michigan will be placed before the people at the spring election.

A bill granting women the right to vote for presidential electors was killed in the New Hampshire House of Representatives Tuesday by a vote of 239 to 98.

Non-partisan candidates for office in Milwaukee, Wis., were given a majority over Socialist candidates in all of the contested nominations Tuesday. The election will be held on April 1.

The new draft of the bill making changes in the corporation sole was passed Tuesday in the Maine House, 81 to 6. The bill was given three readings and passed to be engrossed. The draft places the incorporation of each parish in the hands of a board of trustees, consisting of the bishop, vicar general, the parish priest and two laymen to be named by the bishop.

The Webb Law at Work.

Atchison, Kan., March 20.—Eight wholesale liquor companies of Winthrop, Mo., across the Missouri river from here, were notified by deputies of the railroad and express companies yesterday, that they would accept no more shipments of liquor consigned to Kansas points. This action was taken as a result of the enforcement of the Webb liquor law in Kansas. This practically will put the Winthrop companies out of business, as they had been selling most of their output in Kansas.

DIES RATHER THAN DESERT CHILDREN

Mother Burned with Babies as She
Kneels in Prayer—The Father Is
Fatally Burned.

Chicago, March 20.—Verie Pustalla, a young Italian woman, chose to die rather than to desert her children, and kneeling in the center of a room in her burning house yesterday, met her death.

When the ruins were searched the bodies of the three victims were discovered. The mother was still in a kneeling position. Evidently she had died praying. The two little children, Jane, aged 5, and May, aged 3, died at their mother's skirt.

Frank Pustalla, the husband and father, who escaped through the flames and saved the lives of two children of his brother-in-law, was fatally burned. He has not been told that while he was rescuing two other tots his own babies died in the flames.

Girl Treated by Dr. Fried-
mann Shows Remark-
able Gain

PATIENTS IN NEW
YORK IMPROVE

The Specialist Treats a Hun-
dred in New York De-
formities Hospital

Montreal, Que., March 20.—What the French Canadian residents of this city are already calling "the new miracle" was given its first demonstration yesterday, when Marie Dubois, 20 years old, one of Dr. F. F. Friedmann's first tuberculosis patients treated here, eight days ago, was pronounced on the road to permanent recovery by her own regular physician, Dr. Ethier.

Miss Dubois was a sufferer from tubercular glands. So far advanced was the disease at the time of her treatment by Dr. Friedmann that she lay helpless in bed, unable to move or open her mouth for food without assistance. Yesterday she was walking around her home with the swelling of the glands and all pain gone. Dr. Ethier was amazed, but after careful examination declared his belief that the cure would be permanent.

women and children hemmed in an automobile containing Dr. F. F. Friedmann yesterday afternoon, begging him to treat them for tuberculosis when the doctor went to the hospital for deformities and joint diseases for a clinic.

The police had to make a passage-way.

Dr. Friedmann, whose patients treated on March 8 at Dr. George Mannheimer's office, on examination, have shown wonderful improvement following the injection of living bacilli, the biggest clinic he has had in this country at 10 o'clock yesterday morning in the Hospital for Deformities and Joint Diseases at Madison avenue and One Hundred and Twenty-third street. One hundred persons were selected for treatment on the basis of their case histories and present condition. All have tuberculosis of the joints in various stages of development.

The patients treated in Dr. Mannheimer's office have been examined and wonderful improvement in their cases is reported.

One of the patients, who had been suffering from tuberculosis of the knee and who at the time of Dr. Friedmann's injection, could do little more than bear his weight on the leg affected, Tuesday was able to bend his knee with ease.

Two patients who had been suffering severe pain from tuberculosis of the kidneys and bladder said they were now scarcely aware of pain and that in other ways they had great relief.

The twelve cases of pulmonary tuberculosis which Dr. Friedmann treated at that time all reported that they felt stronger and physically improved in every way. One especially, who had been in a weak condition when the serum was injected, doubled up his fists, bent his arms to display the fitness of his muscles, and said he had developed such a good appetite that only a good thick steak would satisfy him.
