Rutland, Aug. 13.—It was an exciting day at the house of correction yesterday, when two prisoners escaped from the institution, one of them being captured on Pine hill within a few minutes after he got away.

Both Snell and Coffey were working in the marble shop of the house of correction at 9:30 o'clock in the morning, when the former went into a carpenter shop above the marble working room, ostensibly to repair a hammer.

Coffey is 23 years old and has brown hair and brown eyes. He weighs 150 pounds and wore a blue cap and presumably a blue sweater.

HAPPENINGS OF INTEREST FROM DIFFERENT SECTIONS

Justin E. Brush, who died recently at the home of his son, J. S. Brush, in Manchester, was 93 years old.

Miss Ruth Thompson of Springfield stumbled over a milk bottle and fell down a flight of stairs, cutting her face in several places.

Jay Darrow of Lunenburg was fined \$100 and costs of \$12.98 for killing a deer out of season. The case was heard in municipal court.

Ralph Pelletier, a young Brattleboro autoist, was assessed \$28.08 for alleged reckless driving in Keene, N. H., Monday. The arrest was made in Chesterfield last Friday.

H. Parker Kinman, who died in Rutland Sunday afternoon, was born in Clarendon in 1836. He was a veteran of the Civil war and belonged to various military organizations.

In Rutland city court, Clyde Reed pleaded guilty to a charge of rape and was fined \$10 and costs. He is seventeen years old, and the other principal in the case, Julia Marro, is fourteen years old.

The New England section of the National Electric Light association will hold its annual meeting at the hotel Vermont in Burlington September 17, 18 and 19. It will be the fifth annual meeting.

Louis H. Barney, who died Sunday in Swanton at the age of 76 years, was 47 years in the employ of the Central Vermont railroad, a good portion of the time as conductor or baggage master between St. Albans and Boston.

When the Bennington public playground closes for the season, August 23, business men of the city will participate in an athletic tournament. Young people of the village will also take a prominent part in the program.

The principal Catholic churches of Rutland county will celebrate Sunday, September 7, as Holy Name day. There will be special services in each church and in Rutland City there will be a parade of the Holy Name societies.

First Lieutenant William D. Fraser of the coast artillery corps, has been engaged to coach the 1913 football team at Norwich university this year. He formerly played on the Michigan Agricultural college team, one of the fastest in the middle West.

A. E. Wakefield, who died in Hyde Park last Friday at the age of 66 years, was a native of Hardwick, where he lived all his life, until he went to Hyde Park seven years ago. For three years he was a deputy sheriff, and since the erection of the new jail he had been the jailer.

Mason S. Stone, state superintendent of education, and Mrs. Stone have returned from Salt Lake City, where the former attended the annual meeting of the National Educational association. They also traveled extensively in several western states during their absence from Montpelier.

When two automobile parties became tangled in Wilmington Monday, both were spilled over a shallow precipice onto the rocks below, along the Deerfield river, and James T. Gregg of Pawtucket, R. I., who was driving one of the cars, sustained a deep cut on his left leg, caused by a broken wind shield.

Sam Franklin, formerly proprietor of a resort near Fort Ethan Allen, who was arrested in Virginia recently on a white slave count, is trying to get bail of \$10,000 for his release. Franklin is alleged to have followed the Tenth cavalry, colored, on its trip through the South. It is not thought that he can procure bail.

The young son of L. H. Dickerman of East Granville was attempting to run his father's car the other afternoon, when he lost control of the machine and went down a bank into the river. The machine turned turtle with the boy underneath it. The lad escaped injury, and a later examination of the car failed to show where it had been much damaged.

State Cattle Commissioner Fred L. Davis of White River Junction has prepared for the use of cattle drovers and those interested in shipping cattle and horses in or out of Vermont a booklet on the laws governing the handling of the animals. Miss Pansy Marguerite Johnson of a well-known Ithaca, N. Y., family, and Robert Burns Whyte, football and basketball star of the Cornell football team, were married in Bennington August 5, a telegram from the bride being the first intelligence of the elopement, which the mother of the bride admitted the marriage to be.

The fifth summer session of Middlebury college closed last Friday after a successful session. Both in the number of pupils who were enrolled as well as in their ability for doing work, the session surpassed all other sessions of the college, it is said. The total enrollment was 120, of whom 46 were graduates of the college and 64 were engaged in professional teaching.

Early Sunday morning a three-story tenement house in Brattleboro was gutted by flames in an incredibly short time. Over thirty laborers who occupied the house were obliged to jump from second-story windows to save their lives. One of them was taken to the Memorial hospital as the result of serious injuries sustained in jumping.

P. R. Gulger, night operator at the railroad station in Brattleboro for the past four months, was arrested recently, charged with the larceny of a camera from Mrs. Emma Nash. Before Municipal Judge Frank E. Barber he was sentenced to serve not less than five months and not more than five and one-half months in the house of correction at Rutland.
