HAPPENINGS OF INTEREST FROM DIFFERENT SECTIONS

Col. Alexander Hawes, aged 81 years, and a native of Barnet, died Saturday in Honolulu. He was a resident of San Francisco, Cal.

Preparations are about completed for a whirlwind canvass to raise \$20,000 for the Congregational church of Brattleboro, its purpose being to buy the so-called Goodhue property and improve the church plant.

Clarence Sloan of Moretown, serving a sentence of from six months to one year at the house of correction for burglary, has been pardoned by Governor Fletcher. Sloan had just completed the minimum sentence.

William O'Rourke met with an accident Tuesday, Dec. 9, while chopping wood. A tree fell on him and it was necessary to cut away a limb before he could be extricated. It was found that three ribs were broken and that he had received bruises on his back and shoulders.

Mrs. Byron Dickinson left Enosburg Falls Saturday morning for her former home in Ohio. Mr. and Mrs. Dickinson were married about two weeks ago. Mrs. Dickinson was disappointed in Vermont and, being used to living in a city, decided she would return to her former home. By mutual agreement between Mr. and Mrs. Dickinson the latter returned to Ohio.

By the prompt and effective use of a stomach pump the life of William Hibelbert, aged 35, a shoemaker of Waterbury, was saved Sunday afternoon. It is said he bought 10 tablets of morphine and took seven. After the pump had been used, friends kept the man on his feet until 2 o'clock in the morning, until the effects of the poison were away.

The 20 men who have been employed several months in drawing out the logs of the International Paper company at Bellows Falls have been discharged, the company keeping only 12 men for the winter in the yard at North Walpole for loading cars to be brought to the Vermont side of the Connecticut river. The last of the drive was abandoned last week on account of the river freezing, but only a few logs were left.

Jens Christensen was sentenced at Brattleboro Monday morning to not more than seven months nor less than six months in the house of correction for assault on his wife Sunday at their home in Guilford. He had been home from the same institution just six weeks, having been sentenced by Judge William R. Daley of the municipal court on October 12, 1912, to not less than 13 months for a similar offense. At the expiration of his minimum sentence, with time for good behavior deducted, he was paroled by Gov. Fletcher.

Thomas M. Deal, formerly of St. Albans, died at his home in Covington, N. Y., Tuesday, Mr. Deal was born in Champlain, N. Y., 65 years ago and in early life came to St. Albans to enter the employ of the Central Vermont railway, first in the car shops and later as sleeping and passenger car conductor. He was for a time superintendent of the Mississippi Valley branch of the Central Vermont, and for several years previous to his going to Fort Covington he was manager of the Franklin County Creamery association. At the time of his death he was United States immigration officer at Fort Covington.

Educational Butter Scoring at the State University. During 1914 the extension service of the state university plans to do educational butter scoring for Vermont dairymen and creamerymen, in much the same way that similar work has so successfully been done in New York, Pennsylvania, Wisconsin, Minnesota and other states. It is believed that here as there it will help markedly to grade up the quality of dairy products.

Four times yearly shipments will be made to the extension service headquarters at Burlington by such dairymen and creamerymen as desire to take advantage of the opportunity. Directors will be sent in the near future to all creameries and to such dairymen as apply for them. These shipments—preferably five pound packages—will be carefully judged and scored by a competent board consisting of Orrin Bent, for fifteen years the official scorer of the Vermont dairymen's association, H. W. Larsen, the U. S. government creamery expert now assigned for Vermont service, A. A. Horland, professor of dairy husbandry at the state university and L. W. Ayers, state creamery inspector. Each shipment will be tested for its moisture and its salt contents. Each shipper will receive each time:

- 1. A clear statement as to the scoring, and the reason and failing to score perfect in any respect, together with such suggestions as seem pertinent as to his procedure.
- 2. A statement of the water and salt contents of the butter.
- 3. The proceeds in full of the sale of
