The two-pound baby born to Mr. and Mrs. Guy Grou of Newfane, Jan. 5, died suddenly Jan. 18, after apparently being well from birth till the time of its death.

Mrs. Clara Eldred committed suicide by taking paris green Friday at her home in Waterville.

Shelburne bay, Lake Champlain, which was frozen over Thursday, was opened Friday and there was little sign of ice in the afternoon.

H. L. Beard has been postmaster at Waterville for 20 years and did not take an examination for reappointment, having decided to give up the work.

S. S. Washer met with a very painful accident Saturday in West Dummerston. While working with his steam engine sawing wood he cut off the little finger of his right hand at the third joint and cut three other fingers to the bone.

The trustees of the Universalist church of Northfield have made an offer to Clinton Scott of Tutts college to become the regular pastor of the church, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Rev. H. C. Ledyard. Mr. Scott was the reader with the Tutts college glee and mandolin clubs on their recent trip through Vermont.

The new England Power company's new Somerset reservoir is rapidly filling. The water in it is now up to about one-half of the 100-foot height. By next spring this seven-mile artificial lake will have been impounded to hold somewhere near its 23,000,000,000 gallons, thus supplying an all-the-year-around reserve by which the company may substantially increase its deliveries of hydroelectric energy.

Mr. and Mrs. Leonard B. Brown of Newfane have just announced their marriage, which took place in Williamsville seven months ago. At that time the bride, Miss Fray L. Ballou, wished to complete a course in commercial drawing and, although married May 31, kept the fact a secret until now, when her studies are completed. She has been living with her parents, but has now gone to live with her husband.

During the absence of his wife, George H. Murray left a faucet turned on on the second floor of his home in Rutland and then went to work, thinking to stop preventing the freezing of water in the pipes. During the day the sewer pipe froze and when Mr. Murray returned at night the entire lower floor of the house was flooded to a depth of several inches, water having completely saturated the ceilings so that it was falling like rain from above. The household furnishings were badly damaged.

The Burlington winter sports committee is facing a rather difficult problem just at present in trying to meet the big deficit occasioned by the large expense and unseasonable weather of last year. The debt is \$1,200 and represents the cost of labor and materials in building the toboggan slide and making the skating rink. There is also a current expense account this year and no income to meet it, one item being the sum of \$10 to \$12 a week to keep the coasting hill in order.

Following the fire which destroyed the garage building Sunday night in Brattleboro, the village commissioners met Monday evening and voted to purchase: 1,000 feet of hose, four Boston nozzles with Callahan tips, twelve rubber fire coats, twelve smoke protectors and one cellar pipe. The smoke protectors are small devices with sponges that are fixed over the nose and mouth and are not in the nature of a helmet. It was asserted that had the fire department had better facilities for fire fighting the damage might have been materially lessened.
