During their absence, the men fished successfully through the ice in the waters of Lake Champlain and brought home with them a fine string of big fish.

Teamsters in the employ of the Hinman Lumber Co. have been hauling large quantities of pulpwood from Orange and Plainfield to the Central Vermont station in this city, although the present thaw has caused a temporary setback to the company's plans. Saturday three cars were loaded in the C. V. yards and plans were on foot to load as much again to-day, but the rain interfered with this arrangement. Saturday afternoon one of the teams became stuck on the Barre railroad crossing and while fresh horses were being rushed to the assistance of the beleaguered outfit, traffic on the square was at a standstill. Much pulpwood remains to be transported to the local freight yards. The product is consigned from this city to the mills of the International Paper Co. in Milton.

A number of young men from the east side of the city, including several members of the Blue Sox, returned late last night from North Duxbury, from which point they began a successful ascent of Camel's Hump in the morning. The party left Barre at 12:35 a. m. and began the first strenuous lap of their journey when the conductor let them off the train at North Duxbury at 5 o'clock. Five hours were consumed in making the hump of the mountain, the snowshoers arriving on the summit a few minutes after 10 o'clock. More than an hour was spent in scaling the icy cliff which marks the approach to the mountain top. The sky was overcast and the hump was shrouded in a heavy fog so that a sweeping view from the mountain top was not possible at any hour of the day. The boys had dinner in one of the deserted camps and reached the station at North Duxbury around supper-time, although the descent took nearly four hours. In the party of mountain-climbers were Alfred McKay, Eddie Jackson, James Lewis, Edward Carroll, Walter McElroy, Raymond Wilbert and Milton I. Julian.

Three children of the late Mrs. Clinton Heath and their aunt, Mrs. Annie Waldron, who has been making her home in town since the death of her sister, had narrow escapes from asphyxiation Sunday morning, and had it not been for the chance awakening of Clerton Heath, the oldest of the three children, the consequences would have been much more serious. The Heaths live at 165 Washington street and all three children were sleeping on the second floor. Miss Waldron's room is on the ground floor and under the sitting-room, where a coal stove is located. Some trouble was experienced with the stove Saturday night, but the fault had been remedied, supposedly, when members of the family retired Sunday morning at 9:30 o'clock the oldest Heath child awoke feeling very ill. He made his way downstairs, after having failed to awaken his sister, Katherine, and a younger sister. In the meantime Clerton Heath had risen, noting the family of George H. Bishop, and it was Mrs. Bishop who first realized the gravity of the situation. She rushed into the Heath apartments and having aroused Miss Waldron and the children, she opened the windows and summoned a physician. During the day Miss Waldron was complained of being very ill, as the children, both being in bed, had not slept a wink.

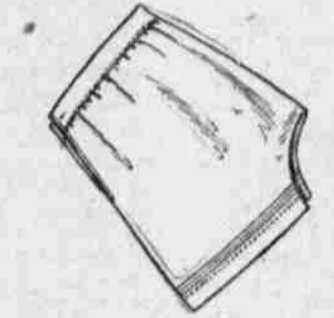
