Ex-Governor U. A. Woodbury is ill at Mt. Clemens, Mich., according to word received in Burlington. He went to the health resort some weeks ago.

Bristol's town debt, which has been increased by \$5,000 in the last year, is causing excitement in that locality. The matter was thoroughly thrashed out in town meeting to-day.

Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Saxton, the former superintendent of the Brattleboro town farm, are in a bad condition as the result of a runaway accident, when the sleigh struck the corner of a bridge and threw the occupants out. Mrs. Saxton had a broken arm and a bad shaking up, while Mr. Saxton had a fracture of the lower and upper jaw, a fracture at the base of the brain, severe laceration of the face and one cheek nearly torn from the jaw. GET FINE BEQUEST.

Kurn Hattin Homes at Westminster Receive \$18,915.57.

Through the will of Miss Lorinda Fitch, late of Wilmington, final settlement of whose estate was allowed in the probate court Saturday, the New England Kurn Hattin Homes receive \$18,915.57, which is the residue and remainder of the estate. The same institution receives also 2,000 shares of the Brattleboro Mining company. All of this to be used "for the girls' department of said homes, if one exists, but if not, given for the general expenses of the homes."

The main buildings of the Kurn Hattin Homes are in Westminster, but the institution maintains the Warner Home in Saxtons River. At present they provide a home for a daughter of the late Augustus Fitch, a well-to-do farmer in Wilmington. She died last July. After the death of the parents Miss Fitch and her two brothers, Augustus and Freeman, neither of whom was married, continued to live in the old homestead, and Miss Fitch inherited her brothers' estates. The money was earned at farming.

There are 19 personal bequests ranging from \$200 to \$2,000, also the following: Congregational church of West Dover, \$900; Congregational church of Union church of Wilmington, \$500; Riverside Cemetery association of Wilmington, \$100; Mountain View Cemetery association of West Dover, \$800; Dover Center Cemetery association, \$200; West Dover Cemetery association, \$200; Intervale Cemetery association of Wilmington, \$300. Of these last bequests it is provided that the interest only is to be used.

The entire estate, after paying the expenses of administration, amounted to \$35,515.57.

STATION WAS SMASHED.

Officer Richard Hurley was notified of the theft and accompanied by Deputy Sheriff Perry B. Gardner trailed the young man to Hayne's corners and put him under arrest. Cummings was on foot when arrested and was evidently making his way toward Hoosick Falls. From Hoosick Falls he said he was going to Albany. While on his way to jail, Cummings twice injected cocaine into his right arm to steady his shaking nerves. He said that he was 22 years old and that he had been a victim of the drug habit for ten years. At the age of 12 he met with an accident which resulted in three broken ribs. One of the fractures, he said, punctured a lung and his recovery was slow. The use of opiates to subdue the pain at this time was the beginning of the habit. He said that he had taken several cures and that none had proved beneficial.

CAR CRASHED INTO TREE.

Motorman Stuck to Job on Burlington Line and Was Not Hurt.

Burlington, March 2.—Summer Carpenter, traction company motorman, had a narrow escape yesterday morning when his car ran off the track on Shelburne street, at the foot of Lodge road, and crashed into a tree. The track was covered with snow and ice, which caused the forward wheels to leave the rails. The rear trucks remained on the iron. The motorman and the conductor, Mr. Hilliard, were going south to meet an earlier car which went through Pine street to Shelburne street crossing mill employs. This car also left the switch on Shelburne street, below Park avenue and the second car was on the way down to relieve her.

HARVESTER CO. FIGHTS ANTI-TRUST DECREE
Says Enforcement of Decree Ordering "Trust" to Dissolve Into Three Parts Would Compel Receivership.

Washington, March 2.—Appointment of a receiver for the International Harvester Co. is inevitable, the supreme court sustaining the anti-trust decree ordering its dissolution, the company declared in its brief filed yesterday with the supreme court in the government's dissolution suit. The case will be argued April 5.

There is no possibility, the brief declared, of complying with the decree ordering the "trust" dissolved into three parts without a receivership, forced sale and enormous loss to stockholders. This, it was stated, is because purchasers could not be found to take over the disintegrated business with other strong, established competitors in the field.

The company denied it has fixed unreasonable prices, made excessive profits, discriminated between competitors, deteriorated products, dismantled plants, treated employes or competitors unfairly, monopolized raw or manufactured materials, has monopolistic patents, has attempted to exclude competitors unfairly or has injured the public. It declared it has benefited consumers.

Profits of the component companies have been less since the combination was made in 1902, it was asserted. Mere size of the business combined, the company asserts, is not proof of illegal combination.

POTATOES IN PLACE OF BREAD.
No Scientific Reason for Not Substituting Them as Wheat Rises Higher.

Washington, D. C., March 2.—If wheat remains at its present high figure or continues to rise in price and if there is a corresponding increase in the price of bread scientists in the United States department of agriculture suggest that the ordinary household will find it advantageous to eat more potatoes and less bread. While potatoes at 60 cents a bushel, ten cents worth—or ten pounds—will give the consumer a little more actual nourishment than two one-pound loaves of bread at five cents each. The protein and fat are present in appreciably larger amounts in the bread, but the potatoes will be found to furnish more carbohydrates, and more heat units.
