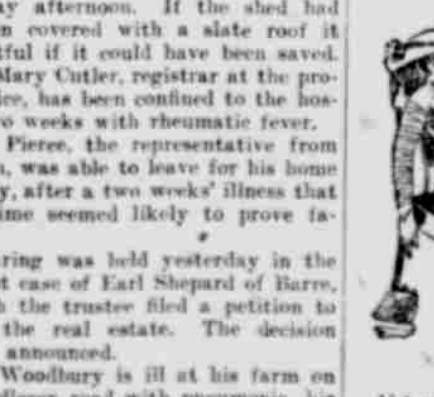
SOUTH CABOT

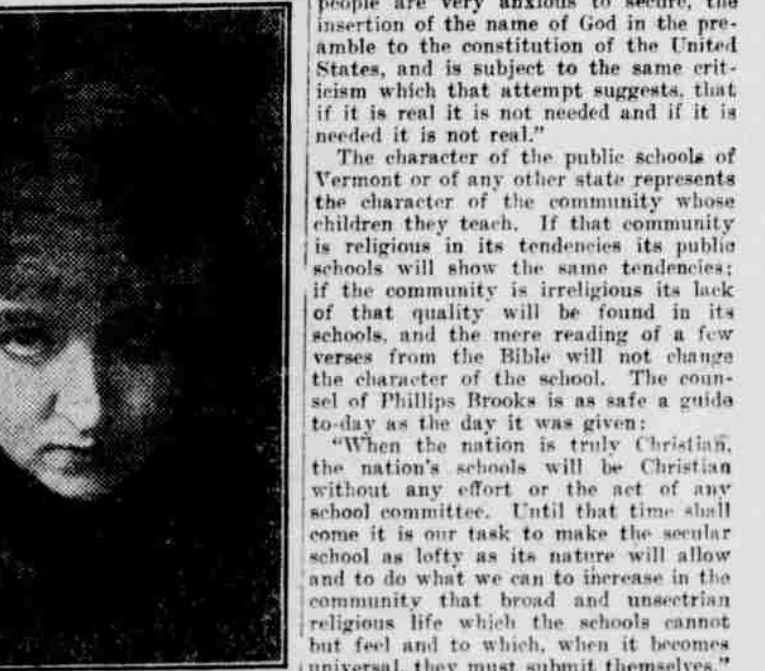
