ABOUT THE STATE HAPPENINGS OF INTEREST FROM DIFFERENT SECTIONS

While watering a three-year-old colt at his home in Jeffersonville a few days ago, Bert Wells was considerably injured by kicks from the animal and was unconscious when found. Several ribs were broken and there were also other injuries.

The March report of the consolidated customs district of Vermont and the county of Coos, N. H., issued Tuesday by the collector, shows a falling off of \$53,459 in revenues collected compared with corresponding month last year in the customs district which included western Vermont only. The shrinkage is credited generally to the situation resulting from the war. Merchandise which was coming through there last March is now being sent abroad from Canada. The duties collected last month were \$7,536 as compared with \$60,995 in March last year. Importations amounted to \$1,619,873 as compared with \$1,183,939 last year.

Mrs. Rosanna C. Mower, who died Saturday at the home of her daughter in Lyndonville, was the widow of Henry C. Mower, for nearly half a century an engineer on the old Passumpsic road. Mr. Mower died about 18 years ago and was, at the time of his death, the oldest engineer on the Passumpsic division.

As Mrs. Frank Fisher entered the train at East Concord a few days ago, to take a trip to St. Johnsbury, the train started, throwing her against the side of the car with such force that her right hand was badly injured, the muscles being crushed and spread in such a way that it will be sometime before she can use her hand.

Roberta Craig, the nine-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert A. Craig of Peacham, got quite badly hurt Saturday, April 3, by climbing upon a dump cart body which was tipped up against the barn. The body fell over pinning her under it across her back. She also received a cut on one eyelid.

Great Demand For Tuberculin Test. State Livestock Commissioner Fred L. Davis of Hartford says that he has more applicants for tuberculin tests of cattle than the department is able to handle. 15 or 18 veterinarians being employed all the time. It is the desire of the farmers and dairymen to get the tests out of the way before cattle are let out to pasture and the calls are coming from all parts of the state. Regarding the present embargo on stock made necessary by the prevalence in the West of the foot and mouth disease, Mr. Davis said that it has not been lifted, the regulations affecting the disposition of livestock coming or going out of Vermont remaining the same. Some lowering of the bars is expected soon, as the situation is improving daily.

DEPOSED OFFICIAL BACK.

J. Frank Kidder Resumes Duties as Burlington Water Superintendent. Burlington, April 9.—J. Frank Kidder resumed his duties as city water superintendent yesterday after an enforced absence since he was deposed last summer by the board of water commissioners, Messrs. Angus, Crady and Leonard. The injunction against Mr. Kidder and the old board has been dissolved by Judge Slack in chambers and the former commissioners A. H. Rutter, Jules Simays and C. H. Jones, assumed control of the department yesterday. Hearing on the application to dissolve the injunction made by counsel for the old board and Mr. Kidder was had late Wednesday. The other side, represented by Max L. Powell, offering no objection to granting the same.

Mr. Wilson, the retiring superintendent, handed over the keys to Mr. Kidder yesterday and left the employ of the city. His plans for the future are not decided upon. Oscar Heinsinger, about whom the proceedings started last spring, has also left the department. His work will be distributed among the present force. Mr. Kidder will take care of work at the filtration plant, the position occupied by Mr. Wilson before he became superintendent, being done away with. There will be no other changes in the force. Samuel Brewer, for three years an employe of the department, will attend to the meters, as in the past. Chief Judge Munson of the supreme court was here this week and read the opinion in the matter of water board proceedings, in which an order was given out a few days ago.
