

U-51 SUNK IN BLACK SEA

The Destroyer of Battleship Majestic Comes to End of Its Career

WAS TROUBLE-MAKER FOR BRITISH NAVY

The Submarine Escaped the Blockade and Went to the Dardanelles

London, July 16.—The German submarine U-51 has been sunk in the Black sea by Russian warships, according to information from Varna, a Bulgarian port on the Black sea, and sent by the Athens correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph company.

EXECUTED AS SPY. Rosenthal Alleged to Have Confessed He Was in German Employ.

London, July 16.—Another German spy has been executed in England, after conviction by court martial. He was Robert Rosenthal, who was arrested in London early in June and confessed, it is alleged, that he had been sent to England by the German admiralty to obtain information concerning British naval matters.
