

### DRY SUNDAY CUTS CRIME

Chicago Has Lowest Record in Its History for Sunday

ONLY 28 SALOONS VIOLATE CLOSING ORDERS

Arrests for Drunkenness Far Below Average—Saloons Lose \$400,000

Chicago, Oct. 12.—Sunday closing of saloons in Chicago for the first time in forty-four years resulted in a Sunday with the lowest crime record in the history of the police department. Chief of Police Healy announced yesterday. Out of 7,152 saloons in the city, only twenty-eight were found to have violated Mayor Thompson's closing order, which became effective at midnight Saturday. Most of the violations were of a minor character and only one saloonkeeper was arrested. There were only sixteen arrests made for drunkenness Sunday and forty-seven on Saturday, as compared with an average of 243 for the two days during several months past. Some of the downtown bars and a few in the densely populated districts opened their places for business between midnight and one o'clock yesterday morning, but the amount of trade was not up to expectations. Saloonkeepers estimated that they lost \$400,000 Sunday, as a result of being obliged to close.

#### MOTLEY MISSING.

And He is Believed to Have Been Lost At Sea.

Boston, Oct. 12.—Chris going hay fishermen were asked to keep a sharp watch for the body of Francis P. Motley, of Boston and Beverly, who was reported to have been lost from the Portland boat of Oct. 1. The disappearance of Mr. Motley was reported last night by C. P. Curtis, a neighbor at Beverly and counsel for the Motley family.

Mr. Curtis stated that Motley had been lost at sea, but declined to state whether he fell overboard or threw himself from the boat. Motley, a graduate of Harvard in 1914, recently had been sentenced to 30 days in jail for recklessly driving an automobile.

It was believed by some of his friends that the disposition of the case which had been appealed, had affected his mind.

#### LEARNS THE SCORE AND DIES.

### BULGARIAN OFFICERS REFUSE TO FIGHT

About Twenty Who are in Switzerland are Unwilling to War on Russia and Serbia.

Geneva, Switzerland, via Paris, Oct. 12.—About twenty Bulgarian army officers who are in Switzerland have refused to join the colors. Four of the officers, including a colonel, who won honors in the war with Turkey, are in Geneva. They state that they are unwilling to fight against Russia and Serbia.

### WOMEN VOTE IN NORWAY.

Large Gain in Socialist Party in Parliament Expected to Follow.

Christiania, Oct. 12.—Women are voting for the first time in Norwegian general elections. There are 170,000 new electors on the rolls. The press forecasts that the women's vote will bring large gains to the Socialist representation in Parliament, making that the strongest single party, although the government expects to maintain itself by a combination of three political groups. The Socialists' platform is devoted largely to an anti-military propaganda. The government program includes a grain monopoly, old-age pension and restrictions of almost a prohibitive character on the sale of alcoholic liquor.

### NO ARMS FOR VILLA

With General Carranza Recognized, His Shrift Shortens

WILL PROBABLY HAVE TO PROTECT ALIENS

South Americans Favor the Washington Stand on Mexico

Washington, Oct. 12.—Secretary Lansing reported formally to President Wilson yesterday the proceedings of last session of the Pan-American conference which decided upon recognition for the Carranza party as the de facto government in Mexico. The president gave his approval. Secretary Lansing said the time when, or the form in which recognition would be extended had not been fixed.

The governments of Bolivia, Uruguay and Guatemala remained to be heard from yesterday in approval of the action of the United States government. The other countries which participated in the Pan-American peace conference through their diplomatic representatives—Argentina, Brazil and Chile—already have sanctioned the work of the conference. The approval of the first named governments is expected momentarily.

The next step to be taken by the United States will be determination of the form in which recognition shall be accorded. It is expected to be extended this week, possibly through formal notification to Eliseo Arredondo, Carranza's official agent here. Prohibition of shipments of arms to factions opposed to the Carranza government will follow.

Although arms embargo will materially weaken the resources of the Villa element, M. Diaz Lombardo, foreign minister of the convention government, in a formal statement given out here announced that the struggle will be continued in Mexico. Similar advice have been received by the state department from American Consular Agent Carlos, following an interview with Villa. No mention was made of withdrawing protection to foreigners, as reported in press dispatches, but officials realize that the legal responsibility for protection of foreigners rests always with the recognized government for all parts of the country, whether in rebellion or not. Americans for this reason were recently advised to withdraw from northern Mexico, but many of them have failed to heed the state department's advice. The Washington government during the Taft administration took the position, however, that even when a recognized government existed in Mexico City the leaders of rebellious factions were personally responsible for the acts of their followers and gave warning to that effect.

This precedent probably will be followed in the event of difficulties now in northern Mexico.

General Carranza telegraphed his agency that Alberto Graciano Granados, sentenced to death for complicity in the killing of President Madero, had been executed Friday after a trial in which "he had every privilege of a defendant under the law."

An official dispatch from Mexico City to the agency said the American Red Cross had closed food distribution headquarters and was sending its representatives back to the United States. The dispatch contended there was no more need for famine relief.

#### Earth Trembles.

Stuttgart, Germany, via wireless to London, Oct. 12.—The seismograph at Stuttgart observatory has recorded strong earth vibrations for the past 24 hours. The disturbance apparently has been central in Europe. Earth tremors were felt at Marienbad during yesterday morning.

### BRITAIN DENIES ASKING RECALL OF SKINNER

Official and Categorical Denial Was Authorized—Consul Sailing Next Monday.

London, Oct. 12.—A categorical denial was officially authorized yesterday of the report that the British government had asked for the recall of Robert P. Skinner, American consul-general in London. Consul-General Skinner, who recently was called to Washington for a conference on the international trade situation, will sail with Mrs. Skinner on the steamer Rotterdam on Monday next.

#### WILSON O. K.'S NOTE TO BRITAIN.

Protest on Hold-up of Cargoes to Be Sent at Once.

Washington, Oct. 12.—President Wilson announced yesterday that he has approved the note to Great Britain protesting against interference with neutral trade. The note is extensive and reviews many cases in which American shipments have been held up for months by British authorities.

Although the note is to be transmitted immediately to London, it will not be made public until it has been presented by Ambassador Page.

### PLANNING THE WEDDING

These Are Busy Days for the Head of the Administration

### HONEYMOON A BIG PROBLEM

Will Not Include the Pacific Coast Expositions, It Is Said

Washington, Oct. 12.—President Wilson and Mrs. Norman Galt, his fiancée, yesterday began making preliminary arrangements for their wedding. The president and Mrs. Galt are not discussing their detailed plans even with their immediate friends and relatives. A wedding trip is considered, but the place has not been revealed and may be kept secret for a time. The presidential yacht *Mayflower* may be used.

Reports that the couple might go to the San Diego or San Francisco exposition apparently were dispelled yesterday, when the president, replying to an invitation from school children in San Diego, asking him to visit the exposition, wrote that he sees no possibility of visiting the Pacific coast at present.

The president went on a short shopping trip yesterday morning and bought a traveling case. Congratulations from all parts of the world continued to arrive at the White House. One cablegram came from President Estrada Cabrera of Guatemala. The president is answering the messages personally.

Despite reports that the wedding might be held very soon, it was said yesterday in very well informed quarters that the plans were still for a wedding early in December, in Mrs. Galt's home here. The president and Mrs. Galt are being urged to go to Pass Christian, Miss., for their honeymoon, by the Misses Lucy and Mary Smith, cousins of the president, whose home is at New Orleans. The president spent Christmas two years ago at Pass Christian, and it was suggested yesterday that he might be married during the Christmas recess of Congress and go for a short trip South.

Mrs. Galt is wearing the diamond engagement ring given her by the president in New York. It had been reported that the platinum ring was set with only a solitary diamond, but it is noticed that it also has several smaller diamonds in the narrow gold band.

### RECTOR KILLS MAN.

Rev. Byron Holley Shoots Lansing Pearsall, Son of Railroad Man.

New Orleans, Oct. 12.—Rev. Byron Holley, rector of St. George's Episcopal church, one of the fashionable congregations in the city, early yesterday shot and killed Lansing Pearsall, son of a prominent railroad man here. Dr. Holley told the police he shot Pearsall thinking he was a burglar.

About 6 o'clock yesterday morning Dr. Holley telephoned police headquarters that he had shot a man in the rectory study. The minister told the police that while in his office he heard someone in his study adjoining. Taking a pistol he stepped into the study and saw a man near the door.

"The intruder did not answer my questions as to who he was and what he

wanted," Dr. Holley said, "and when I ordered him out he made a motion as if to draw a weapon. I fired and the man fell."

Several hours later the man was identified at the morgue by Nathan G. Pearsall, claim agent of the Texas & Pacific railroad, as his son, Lansing, 22 years old. No reason for the young man's presence in the rectory could be given by his parents or friends. Dr. Holley said he never had seen Pearsall before.

Police found a window in the rectory parlor had been opened. Young Pearsall lived several blocks from the Holley home on the next street.
