This town is to have a lecture course this winter, a contract having been signed with the Eastern Empire (youth) bureau by the local committee, the entertainments to be given, with the dates of their production, to be as follows:
Harmony trio, Oct. 29; Mason jubilee singers, Nov. 8; Charles D. Roberts, Dec. 9; Litchfield-Lattimer duo, Jan. 17; Morris G. Hindus, Feb. 25.

This is said of the Harmony trio: Three splendid voices, well balanced and thoroughly trained, readings of merit artistically rendered, sketches in costume, especially arranged, piano solos of symphony style, mandolin and guitar accompaniments, make up a program full of variety and of exceptional attractiveness."

The Mason jubilee singers appear in a good old-fashioned jubilee program. The peculiar charm of the quaint southern melodies is not only indescribable, but imperishable, as sung by these four selected negro voices.

Charles Roberts is both artist and entertainer. His rapidly shown pictures afford many surprises. All who appreciate refined humor, a skillful blending of crisp thought, fine art and rapid action will be delighted with Mr. Roberts.

Of the Litchfield-Lattimer duo, so great is the variety of the program, consisting of selections on the violin, Irish songs, readings and bright, entertaining

laugh-provoking jokes, that the tastes of all are suited.

Mr. Hindus is a native of Russia and knows the joys (what few there are) and the sorrows of peasant life in that country, and the tyrannies of church and state, as only natives can. Young people should hear him to learn what it means to live under the stars and stripes.

The local committee has tried, and thinks it has succeeded, in putting on a good program in the lecture course of 1915 and '16, and hopes it will have the hearty support of the people financially in the sale of tickets, which may be purchased at L. W. Morse's store or of Prudence Taylor.
