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FORD ENTREATS NATIONS AT WAR TO END STRIFE

Nearing Europe, the Leader of the Peace Argonaut Delivers a Broadside Amid Discord in His Own Party as Resolution on U. S. Preparedness Becomes an Issue

SOME THREATENED TO LEAVE THE PARTY

Sam McClure and Ben Lindsey, Among Others, Took Ground That Resolution Was Unpatriotic; Their Opponents Replied That McClure, Et Al., Misunderstood Ford's Invitation

On board steamship Oscar II, by wireless, via steamship Noordam, Dec. 13.—A resolution condemning President Wilson's preparedness policy brought a protest from some of the prominent members of Henry Ford's peace party last night when it was presented for adoption.

More than a dozen members, including S. S. McClure of New York and Judge Ben Lindsey of Denver, refused to sign on the ground that the resolution was unpatriotic.

In giving his reasons for doing away with the liquor traffic and sale the speaker cited many instances where the use of alcohol had destroyed the manhood and womanhood of individuals and made them worse than beasts.

Mr. Ford to-day sent out an appeal to the rulers of Europe, addressed individually to each reigning monarch, which said in part: "We come in this time of trouble not to add to your burdens but to help lift them."

THE CORRECTION OF THE EVIL BY REGULATION, not the solution of the difficulty, "is an evil which must be destroyed, if it is a good it must be encouraged."

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AUSTRIA NOTE SHARP DEMAND

For Prompt Denouncement of Sinking of the Italian Ship Ancona

"INHUMAN" ACT IS REFERRED TO

A "Wanton Slaughter" of "Helpless Men, Women and Children"

Washington, D. C., Dec. 13.—The text of the American note to Austria-Hungary regarding the sinking of the Italian steamship Ancona, made public last night, reveals a formal demand by the United States for prompt denouncement of the "illegal and indefensible" act; for punishment of the submarine commander and for reparation by the payment of indemnity for the killing and injuring of innocent American citizens.

The demands follow a statement informing Austria-Hungary that "the good relations of the two countries must rest upon a common regard for law and humanity." The note arraigns the shelling and torpedoing of the liner as "inhuman" and "wanton slaughter" of "helpless men, women and children."
