Bradstreet's Weekly trade report indicates that the present difficulties in the granite trade will somewhat effect general conditions, but that other lines of manufacturing show a tendency to increase. From agricultural districts farmers report that the demand for produce holds good. Potatoes still bring

good prices and while there is apparently a fair amount of hay, prices hold up well. Loose hay brings from \$13 to \$18 per ton, while first grade of pressed hay sells at \$21.

She described particularly the places she saw, Bruges, Brussels, the field of Waterloo, Antwerp,

The Hague, Scheveningen and Amsterdam. A very good idea of the countries, the manners and customs of the people could be gained from Mrs. Turner's talk which contained many interesting bits of historical and literary allusion, and was very interesting.
