JUMPS FROM AUTO WHEN GASOLINE IGNITES CLOTHING

Machine Which H. Young Was Driving Crashes Into Bank

His clothes having become ignited from the scratch of a match upon his gasoline covered trousers, Harry A. Young of Miles Pond jumped from the automobile in which he was riding with his wife and a party of friends and rolled in the dirt in an effort to extinguish the flames, while the machine, which was traveling at a fairly good rate of speed ran wild for some distance finally crashing into a steep bank. The accident happened while the automobile party was enroute to Barre on a pleasure trip. Mr. Young was badly burned, but the occupants of the runaway car were injured only slightly.

Mr. Young ran out of gasoline on the road and was forced to return to the nearest garage to secure a supply. He brought the gas back and proceeded to pour it into the tank of the car. In the course of the operation he spilled a small portion of it on his clothes. Mr. Young had just got the car underway again when he decided to have a smoke. He drew a cigar from his pocket and scratched a match on his trousers with which to light it. As he did so, his clothes caught fire and the flames spread rapidly. In an instant the man jumped from the seat and into the road where he rolled over and over in the dirt until he had smothered the blaze but not until he was burned severely about his arms and legs. Meantime the machine, which was in first speed, continued on, no one in the car either knowing what to do or having presence of mind enough to apply the brake. The mad dash of the machine ended only when it ran up a bank. Fortunately none of the passengers received serious injury. The front part of the car was badly damaged.
