Ingalls and King Held For Manslaughter (Continued from page one)

The following verdict was rendered: "That the said Patrick J. Shevlin on the 30th day of August 1922, at the Sherbrooke Hospital of this city, came to his death from injuries received in an automobile accident, which happened within about one mile north of Stanstead Plain, and the said undersigned jurors, after hearing the evidence adduced at this inquest, are of the opinion that Homer C. Ingalls and Lewis F.

King, while being both intoxicated and carelessly driving their automobile at a very high rate of speed, were the direct cause of his death, and the said jurors are of the opinion that the said Homer C. Ingalls and Lewis F. King should be sent before a criminal court to stand their trial on a charge of manslaughter."

Ingalls, whose license it is claimed was revoked two years ago, is said to have been driving the car at some time prior to the accident but it does not seem to be certain as to who was driving when the crash occurred. Ingalls was injured in the collision, but was placed under guard in the Sherbrooke Hospital after the verdict had been returned. He was sufficiently recovered, however, to appear in the local court for the preliminary hearing.

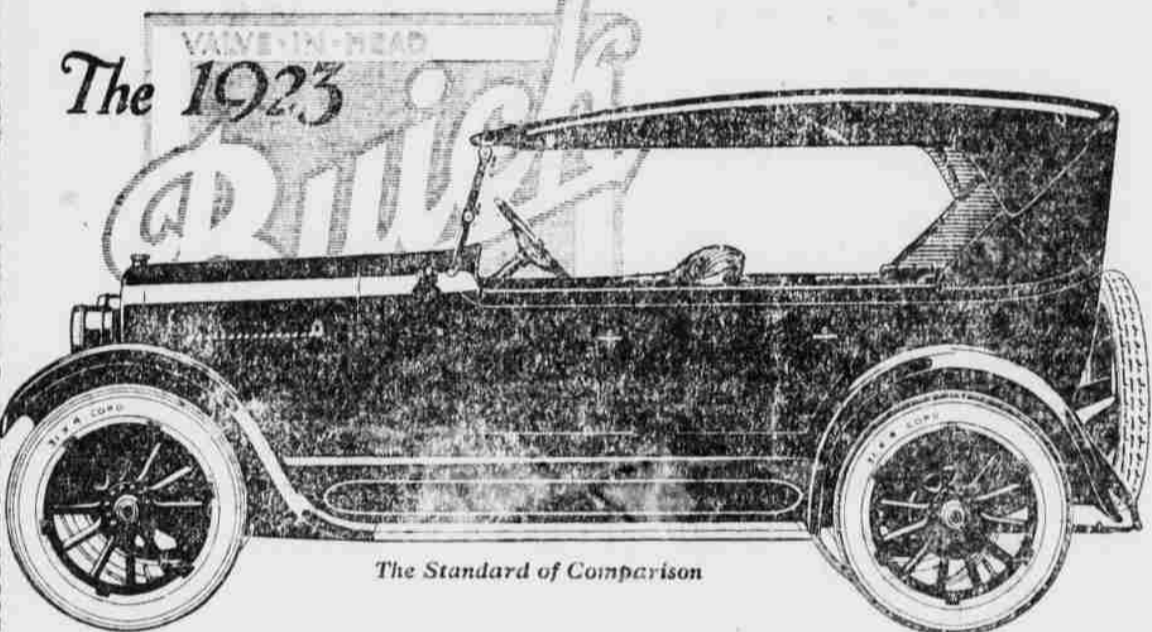

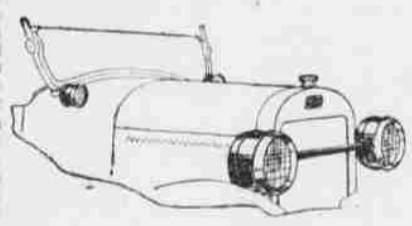
