A dance was held after the game and was attended by about 40 couples.

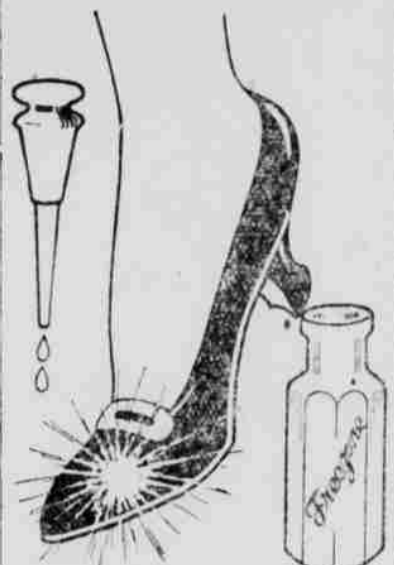
Mrs. Mary Bixbee Dead at Newport
