MR. COSTA GLAD HE IS NOW BACK FROM ITALY
 Comments On Attempts of Fascisti to Get Power
 D. Costa, proprietor of the New York Fruit Store on Railroad street returned Thursday from a trip to Italy and France where he and Mrs. Costa have been visiting relatives, since early in the fall.
 Mr. and Mrs. Costa left for New York on September 11th last, they took a boat to Geneva, Italy, the home of Mrs. Costa's parents. Mrs. Costa had not seen her parents since a previous visit fifteen years ago.
 After spending six days in Geneva, Mr. and Mrs. Costa went to France where they spent the remainder of their vacation in Paris and at the resorts at Cherbourg and Marseilles.
 They encountered ideal weather during their entire trip. The majority of the time it being necessary to seek shade in order to be comfortable.
 Mr. Costa stated that the Italian people are very much enthused with the attempts of the Fascisti to bring about better conditions in Italy, but that it may be only the advent of something new, that will hold their fancy until it becomes monotonous. Mr. Costa also observed the conditions of trade in Italy. He states that they are making enormous wages as far as the amount of money is concerned. As he stated, "buy a little thing and it will take a half hour to count out the money for it. Their money is no good."
 He said, "I am glad to get back to St. Johnsbury. It is a great place. America is the only place to live in."

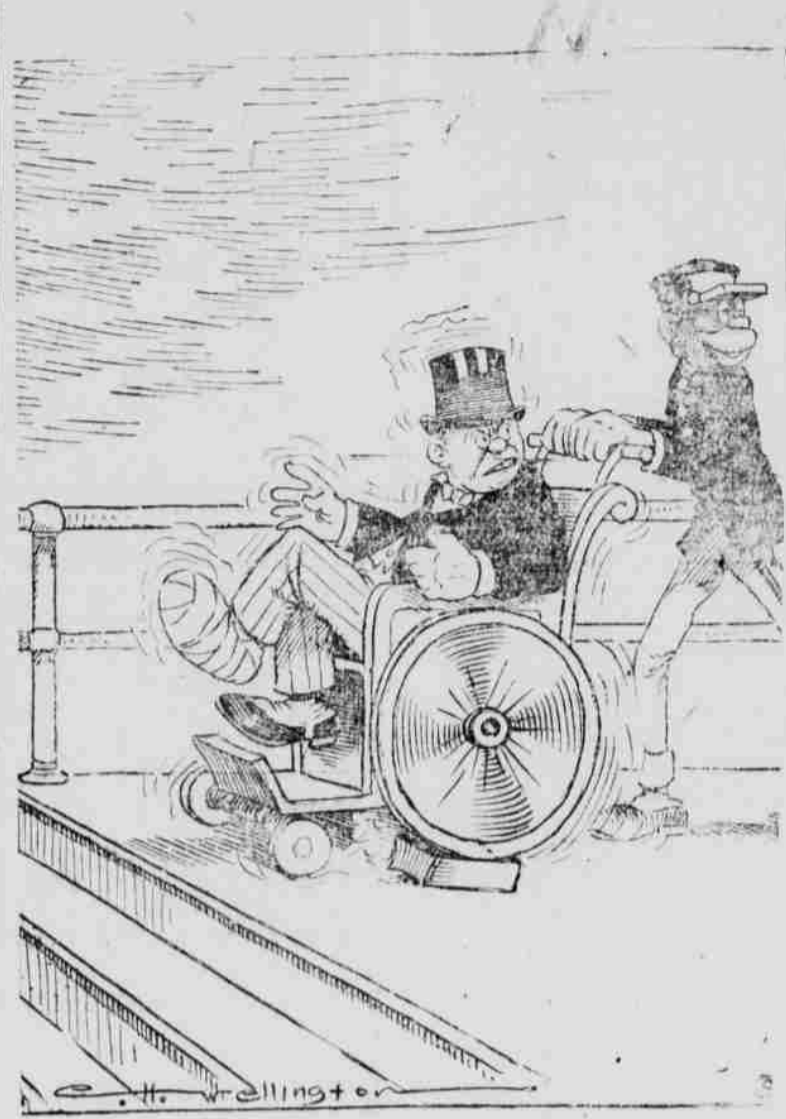
POPE CONDEMNS MODERN MARRIAGES
