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All Collegians Lose to Co. D in Fast Contest

In Metcalf the left forward for New Hampshire the visitors held a continued threat, as was H. Fernald, the rangy right guard. These two men seemed invincible. They were every where in the play and when they took a shot at the big loop it was a safe bet that there was another point for the collegians. L. Fernald and Tuttle also came in for their share of the honors by the great passing game they exhibited.

The passing of both teams was above par, and the guarding air that would fall inside the loop side got the big sphere, his possession was sure to be disputed by an opponent, and the energy that both sides displayed made the contest doubly exciting.

The Company D lads seemed to have difficulty in passing the meshes. Several times Connor and Dumas made spectacular heaves that would fall inside the loop, roll tantalizingly about and then lazily hop out into the hand of some ready warrior.

No less exciting was the contest between St. Johnsbury academy and the alumni of that institution the former winning by a score of 31 to 11. The academy lads had a bit the better of the contest because of their intensive training, but the alumni in spite of the fact that many of them had not played a game since their graduation, put up a contest that kept a look of worry on the faces of the students.

Pike was easily the star of the academy lads, although he confined his playing entirely to himself. The work of Dickinson, Shields, and Scruton was also outstanding in its quality.

For the Alumni the work of Moore, McLane and Pike was of a stellar quality, but the latter had been disqualified at the end of the first period on personal fouls.

FIRST PERIOD
The first period opened with Company D leading off in a matter of fact way which soon turned to a whirlwind fight as the visitors jumped into the breach with wild abandon. New Hampshire got the ball and in a great exhibition of passing put the ball into local territory. Goslant dove head first into the melee and emerged with the pill, which he shot to Connor. Pass snapped to Fisk who was at once surrounded by a mob of the enemy. Right here "Lucky" showed the stuff that makes basketball and dodging and curving he made a beautiful one handed throw that settled through the meshes for the first score of the game. A moment later he repeated the performance on a pass from Dumas.

New Hampshire right here took a spurt that made the fans anxious. Metcalf gripped the lemon on a pass from H. Fernald and going the length of the court made a one handed offering that set the crowd wild. Followed an exhibition of passing and juggling the ball between Goslant and Connor that kept New Hampshire doing the toe dance. Dumas fouled Burr twice, but he failed to register in either case. Connor was fouled by H. Fernald. He shot the pill entering the bed for a seemingly sure shot but after exhorting about for the space of a minute it rolled out into the hands of the ever ready Burns.

Burns and Dumas were fouled for pushing and New Hampshire tallied the points. The period ended with Company D, 9 New Hampshire 7.

SECOND PERIOD
This stanza started off with a rush. Goslant, Connor and H. Fernald making dashes that brought the crowd to their feet. Fernald getting the ball rushed the length of the floor for a goal only to be stopped by the demon-like dive of Connor. F. Fernald and Dumas were fouled for pushing, each tallying.

Dumas snatched the ball from the toss-up and shot from the middle of the floor, the nutmeg settling through the meshes for another Scaldtown point. After a wonderful exhibition of floor work by Burns and H. Fernald the period ended with the score Company D 15, New Hampshire 10.

THIRD PERIOD
The third period opened with each team playing tight. Both gave a clever exhibition of passing, calling for the time when they could break through the opposing defence for a tally. Both were fouled several times for mixing it up too strenuously. H. Fernald was the only one who scored from a foul and this was called illegal by referee Kanney, the player being out of bounds. Each team threw discretion to the winds and piled into the scrimmage in a manner that made the fans hysterical.

Burns made a beautiful one handed shot, but the jinx were against him and it rolled out. Both teams tallied from double fouls. Goslant made a great attempt at a goal but this also rolled out. H. Fernald again demonstrated his ability as a crack shot when he arched in a beauty from the middle of the floor tying the score at 16 to 16 and the crowd went wild. From all sides came commands, entreaties, and imploring for the locals to score.

Chief Burns called time out and held a conference with the Scaldtown Braves. With one minute left to play they again took the floor and Whitey Dumas, heading the

voice of the fans for a winning score repeated that which he had already done earlier in the evening and threw a long high pass into the hammock which put St. Johnsbury two points in the lead and the crowd went into joyful hysterics. The ball was tossed up again and Burns was fouled by Tuttle. Curley shot the point putting the game on ice and assuring the twelfth straight win. The whistle blew with a final score of Company D 19, All Collegians 16.
