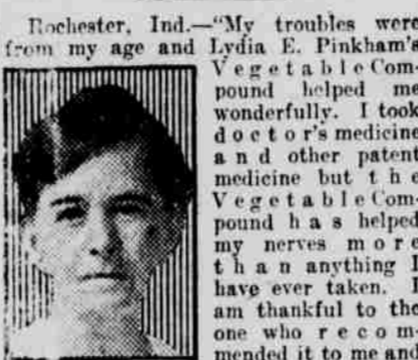

Democrats Defend League of Nations

(Continued from Page One) the conditions which it criticizes and deplores," he continued.

"The oppressed peoples of the earth will look to it in vain. It contains no message of hope for Ireland; no word of mercy for Armenia; and it conceals a sword for Mexico. It is the work of men concerned more with material things than with human rights. It contains no thought, no purpose which can give impulse or will to those who love liberty and hope to make the world a safer and happier place for the average man."

He declared that the peace time record of the democratic party from March 1913 to the outbreak of the world war has to its credit "more effective, constructive and remedial legislation than the Republican party had placed upon the statute books in a generation."

Praising the administration's course in the war he said: "We fought a great war, for a great cause and we had a leadership that carried America to greater heights of honor and power and glory than she has ever known before in her entire history."

Referring to congressional investigations by "smelling committees," he said that over 80 investigations have been made, over two million dollars wasted and "the result has been to prove that it was the cleanest war yet fought in the history of civilization."

He dwelt particularly on attacks made upon the President. Malice followed him to the peace table, he said, and wide spread propaganda made it imperative when he returned from Paris to "make a struggle for that which had been won at incalculable cost. This meant wreck of health, sickness for months on a bed of pain; and worse, the sickness of heart which comes from the knowledge that political adversaries are savagely destroying not merely the work of men's hands, but the world's hope of settled peace. This was the affliction—this the crucifixion."

Mr. Cummings continued that in one sense "it is quite immaterial what people say about the president. Nothing we can say can add or detract from the fame that will flow down the unending channels of history."

Senator Lodge, he said, refused to offer constructive amendments to his any time. "So intolerant was his attitude that he would not even consider a compromise proposed by former President Taft of his own party and which was assured of support of 40 Democratic senators. Senator Lodge knew that he controlled the senate and that in his own time and way he would destroy the treaty."

Gov. Coolidge Received LL. D. from the U. V. M.

(Continued from Page One) plan of man. That plan was for the aggrandisement of power, for earthly glory, for a place in the sun, for military supremacy. It came as the irresistible shock of war in which the artificial in human relationship was cast aside and the real revealed. If despotism has not yet been banished from its rule over people at least it no longer wears a crown, it is no longer glorified anywhere but denied everywhere, and wherever practiced now masquerades under popular sovereignty. The ideal of the founders of this University is beginning to grip the earth in its entirety.

"Faith in the people is an American ideal. Not faith in their ignorance or their prejudice. If men are only selfish the war is in vain. We might just as well accept the Prussian standard and each seize whatever he have the power to hold. But a faith that men act with knowledge rejecting the false, accepting the true, proud not of gain but of sacrifice.

"An American ideal is equality. Not that all are equal in degree; there are differing glories, as of sun, moon and star, but all of this kind, tolerating no class distinction, no privilege save that which comes from service, no plutocrat, no proletariat, no authority save that which is derived from the consent of the people.

An American ideal is peace. Not that peace which is wrought by the force of the sword, not that peace which is bought by a cringing servitude, but that peace which abides with justice, which follows the mutual requirement of scrupulous observance and discharge of all obligations.

"There are others, important, compelling, but these indicate the line of advance. They are not yet realities but they are ideals toward which progress is being made. To them we cannot yet read our title clear but we can spell out the beginnings.

"The teachings of this university are plain. The hopes of its founders are clear. They are the source of all character and character is the source of revelation. Go forward in the line of duty, small or great, under discipline, conscious that from doing comes the power to do more, firm in the faith of the fathers, seeking the enlightenment of education, surpassing the hopes of the past, ensuring liberty by accepting responsibility, that this whole nation made like-minded with Washington and Lincoln may continue to show forth to the world a revelation of the way, the truth, and the light."

The degree of doctor of law was conferred upon Gov. Coolidge. The university graduated a class of 125 and conferred honorary degrees on the following in addition to Gov. Coolidge, Doctor of Laws, Ralph R. Stewart of Boston and Edward G. Spaulding, professor of philosophy of Princeton; doctor of divinity, Rev. Henry J. Kilbourne and Rev. Isaac C. Smart of Burlington, Vt.; doctor of letters, Bert H. Hill, head of the American Classical school at Athens, doctor of engineering, Charles E. Scribner of New York.
