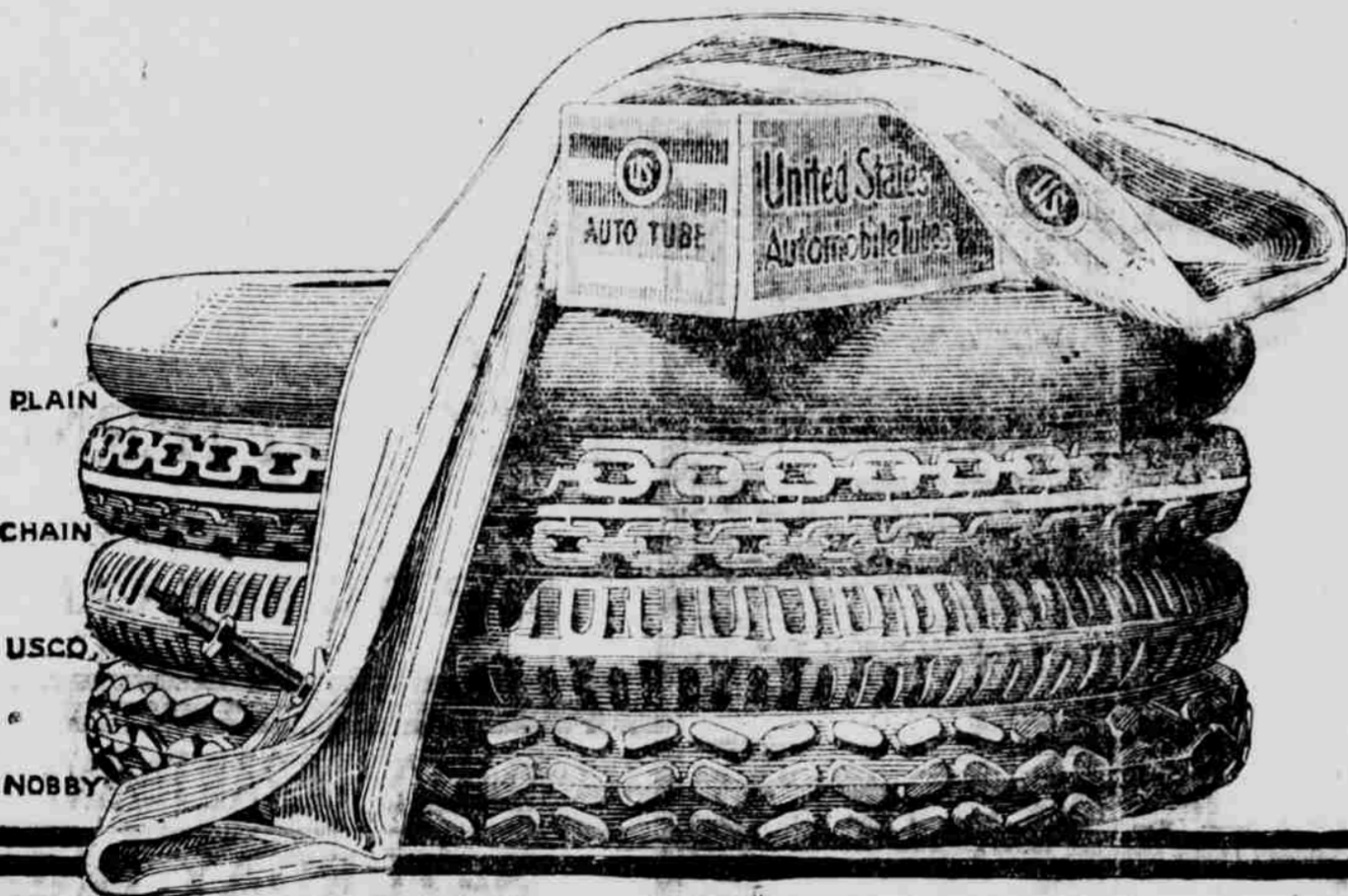

### ORLEANS CO. HAS FOUR CANDIDATES FOR SENATOR

#### Westmore Citizens Claim Right to Office—Complete Ticket Filed

The petitions and assents of all candidates for county offices at the coming primaries in Orleans county have been filed with County Clerk H. B. Cushman of Newport and they indicate that there will be considerable competition for the Republican nomination for several offices. Five Republicans seek the office of assistant judge, and from the five, two will be selected to run. For the nomination for senator from Orleans county, four Republicans have filed petitions, and of these two are from the small community of Westmore, which claims that its citizens have never before received a county office, and on that basis seeks to establish its citizens in both senatorial positions. W. D. Miller and F. W. Tenney both seek to succeed themselves in the office of assistant judge, while Solon E. Gray of Derby Line is the only candidate for the Republican nomination for the office of high bailiff which he occupies at present, and Everett J. Hill is the only Republican to file petitions for the office of sheriff which he has held for some time. The Democratic primaries offer no contests and no candidate for State's Attorney. The county ticket will be as follows: State's Attorney, A. W. Farnham of Newport and Hubert S. Pierce of Newport; Republican assistant judges, W. D. Miller of Troy, F. W. Tenney of Albany, A. P. Sweet of Lowell, A. C. Chase of Westmore, Fred L. Parlin of West Charleston, Republicans, Dennis Sheehan of Troy and John H. Merrill of Newport, Democrats; county senators, Roscoe M. Cowles of Albany, M. E. Calkins of Westmore, Urbin W. Brown of Westmore, W. W. Blodgett of Newport, Republicans; William Pike of Derby and Eugene A. Pike of Irasburgh, Democrats; high bailiff, Solon E. Gray of Derby Line, Republican; G. Herbert Moulton of Barton, Democrat; sheriff, Everett J. Hill of Newport, Republican; Roy P. Skinner of Newport, Democrat; Judge of Probate E. J. Smith of Newport, Republican, and Amos P. Bean of Glover, Democrat.

**BENJAMIN G. WATKINS**  
Benjamin G. Watkins, who passed away at his home on Central street on Tuesday, was born in Leeds, P. Q., on March 25, 1848, in which town he passed his early boyhood and received his early education. He moved at the age of seven to Inverness, P. Q., and resided there until 20 years of age. From there, he entered the United States and lived in North Concord, Vt., pursuing the occupation of a sawyer in a mill there. He married Betsy Amandy Rice of North Concord while there, and moved when the mill in which he was employed shut down, to Lyndonville. There he entered the employ of the Boston and Maine railroad, for which he worked 43 years, 9 months, and some few days. After six years of service in Lyndonville, he moved to Newport and was employed in the railroad yards here until his death. About two years ago, he retired on account of failing health, and was pensioned by the railroad. Mr. Watkins was a man of great popularity in Newport, where his even nature and his generosity were widely known. He was a very large man and his unusual feats of physical strength were the source of considerable admiration on the part of his many associates. He was a Master Mason, had reached the Commandery and his loyalty to Masonry was a source of great pride to him. ### CARRIED FIVE GALLONS OF "HIGH WINES"

#### Customs Officer Seizes a "Cargo" of Contraband at Canadian Line

One man is now lodged in the county jail at Newport and another is out on bail of \$200 pending trial for violation of section 10 of the Volstead Act at Beechers Falls on Monday. Raymond and Gilbert Long, brothers, were apprehended at Beecher's Falls and complaint was made against them by Homer B. Corliss, deputy collector of customs. They were brought to Newport by the officer on Monday afternoon, and a hearing was given before Commissioner Walter H. Cleary, who bound them over to district court in Rutland in October. Raymond Long succeeded in producing his bail, while his less fortunate brother Gilbert is still waiting in jail for his release. The story of the smuggling charges that the two men on Monday had in their possession five gallons of so called "Canadian High Wines" in five tin cans. They brought the liquor to the "Line House" at Beechers Falls in suitcases, each man carrying one. Officer Corliss seized the liquor, put the men under arrest, and shortly afterward, he brought them to Newport.
