Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Steele and daughter of West Barnet were in town Thursday with a new Reo truck.

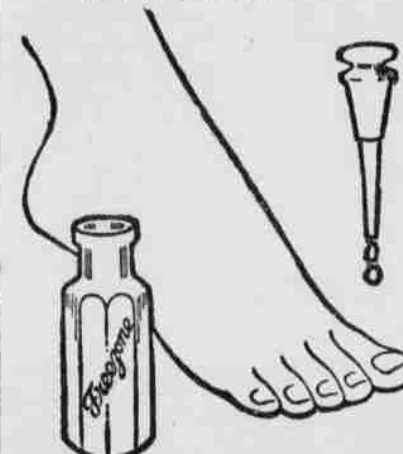
Mrs. James E. Welch, who has spent the past week with her father, Henry E. Morrill, returned to her home in Ryegate Thursday.
