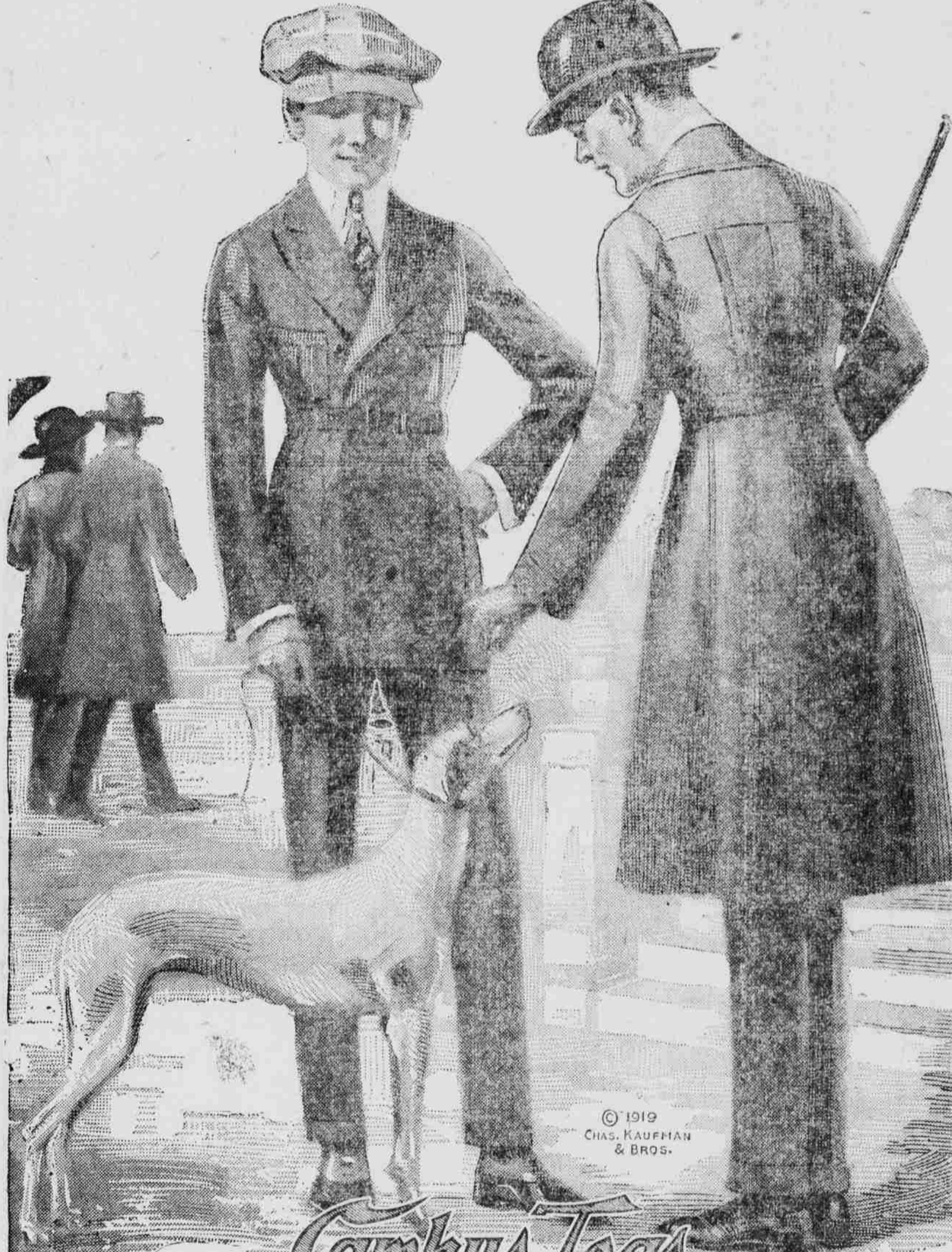
### Preliminary Exceptions Filed In Long Case

MONTPELIER, Nov. 13—Attorney J. Ward Carver, counsel for George A. Long, who was sentenced to life imprisonment for the murder of Mrs. Lucia C. Broadwell at Barre May 3, has filed preliminary exceptions, which may be amended within 30 days, to take the case on appeal to the Supreme Court. Mr. Carver explained that this step was

necessary to save any rights the respondent had before court adjourned. It may be six months or a year before the case is argued.  
State Atty. Earl K. Davis has filed information in court against Mrs. Isabel Parker to the charge of keeping a disorderly house. No entry of discontinuance was entered today in her murder case. Mrs. Parker is in a weak condition at the jail and her attorneys say she can be brought in to the courthouse only on a stretcher.
