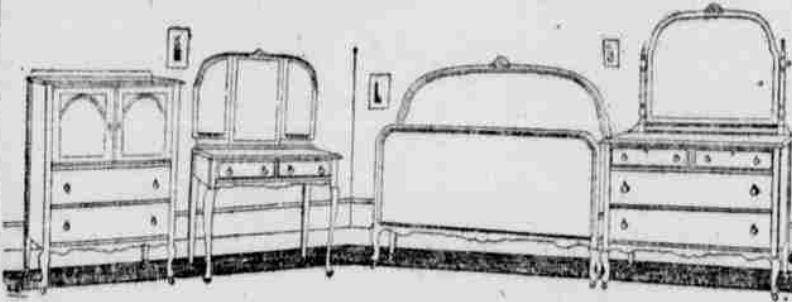

The following taken from a Seneca Falls, N. Y., paper will be of interest to many in this city, as the person involved, C. T. Campbell, was until a few years ago a long-time resident of this city: "Papers were signed Tuesday, Jan. 27, transferring the ownership of the Seneca Falls Granite Works from A. M. Nelson to Charles T. Campbell of this town. Mr. Nelson is retiring from the business, after having conducted it for the past 15 years. The new owner is a practical granite worker, having been connected with the granite monumental industry for 30 years. Coming from Scotland in 1890, he settled in Barre, Vt., the granite center of the world, where he was employed 25 years as an expert carver and letterer. He has been employed by Mr. Nelson for over three years in the capacity of workman, so that to a great many people in Seneca Falls he is no stranger. Many of the beautiful memorials erected here have been designed and executed by him. Mr. Campbell and family live on West Fall street."

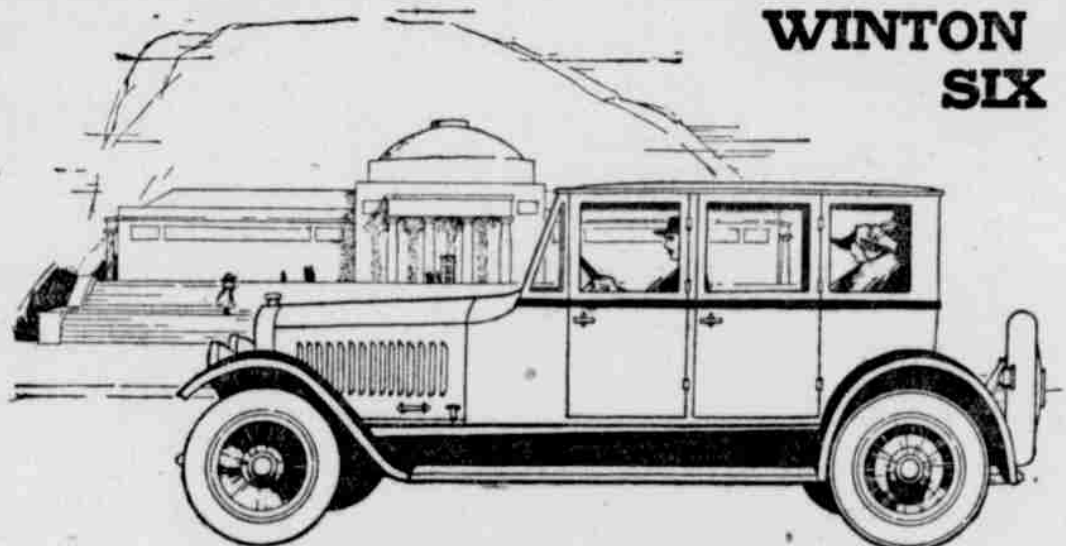
