Happenings of Interest from Different Sections.

The Rutland hospital drive for funds has realized \$1,310 up to Monday night.

John Spargo of Old Bennington has joined the staff of The Independent, a New York weekly.

M. A. Bundy of Burlington has been awarded the contract for constructing a sewer pavement on Main street in Enosburg Falls.

A. E. Sherman caught in a trap in his dooryard in Ludlow village on a recent night a large gray wildcat, weighing 14 pounds. A large deer also came into the yard not long ago.

The Danby four corners correspondent reports that 46 years ago May 1 the snow was a foot deep on the level there and the sleighing was good, except that the roads were badly drifted.

Now that residents of Belmont have purchased Starr lake and all the land surrounding it, they have applied to the state and government fisheries for yellow perch and black bass for stocking purposes.

Maple sugar producers of Underhill, Jericho and West Bolton have had a meeting looking toward an organization for co-operative sugar marketing. Temporary officers were elected and a formal organization will be made later.

F. P. M. Derwacter has resigned the pastorate of the North Bennington Baptist church, the resignation to take effect the third Sunday in June. Dr. and Mrs. Derwacter will work in a foreign field, having been accepted by the missionary board.

Harlow K. Graves of Sheldon, who sued Oakley T. Green of Sheldon for alienating his wife's affections, has withdrawn his suit and signed a statement that he is convinced the charge was unwarranted. The case was to have been tried at the September term of Franklin county court.

The men of Middlebury college voted to institute the daylight saving plan there, but the women of the college voted against it, and, as their consent was necessary at that time, will be continued. The women contended that the plan would interfere with the schedules of the girls teaching in the high school.

William S. Mayo of Albany, N. Y., has brought suit for \$20,000 against the Rutland railroad as a result of the wreck at Rockingham March 14. Mr. Mayo alleges that he received injuries and a shock to his nervous system which have made him ill ever since the wreck, as he was in the smoking car of the Green Mountain flyer.

Mayor Dunn of Rutland has nominated John P. Reedy as chief of the fire department, in place of A. A. Courcelle, who resigned last week with other members of the department. An increase of salary of \$100 a year was granted at the aldermen's meeting Monday evening for each fireman, with a bonus of \$100 besides, to be paid at the end of the year. Mr. Courcelle and L. F. Pollard, another fireman, who resigned, are working in the Rutland railroad shops.

BUSINESS MAN RETIRES

William F. Burditt, Rutland, Transfers Interest to Sons.

Rutland, May 5.—William F. Burditt, one of Rutland's oldest and most prominent business men, has transferred his interest in Burditt Brothers' establishment to his sons, Wilbert E. Burditt and George N. E. Burditt, who have been associated with him several years. The concern handles grain, flour and coal. The late Jay Gould was interested in it in its early days.

Says Vermont Cows Need Feed.

Burlington, May 4.—"Cows in the state of Vermont are in more than healthy condition this year than most years in the past," says one of the farmers of the state attributing the cause of this to the high cost of grain and other foodstuffs for the cattle," says John Fuller, officer for the Humanely Society, who has been doing considerable investigating in this section during the past few weeks.

A large number of investigations have been made on farms in the vicinity of Burlington and in Chittenden county during the past few weeks and Mr. Fuller says the cattle were never so poorly fed and taken care of as they are at present.

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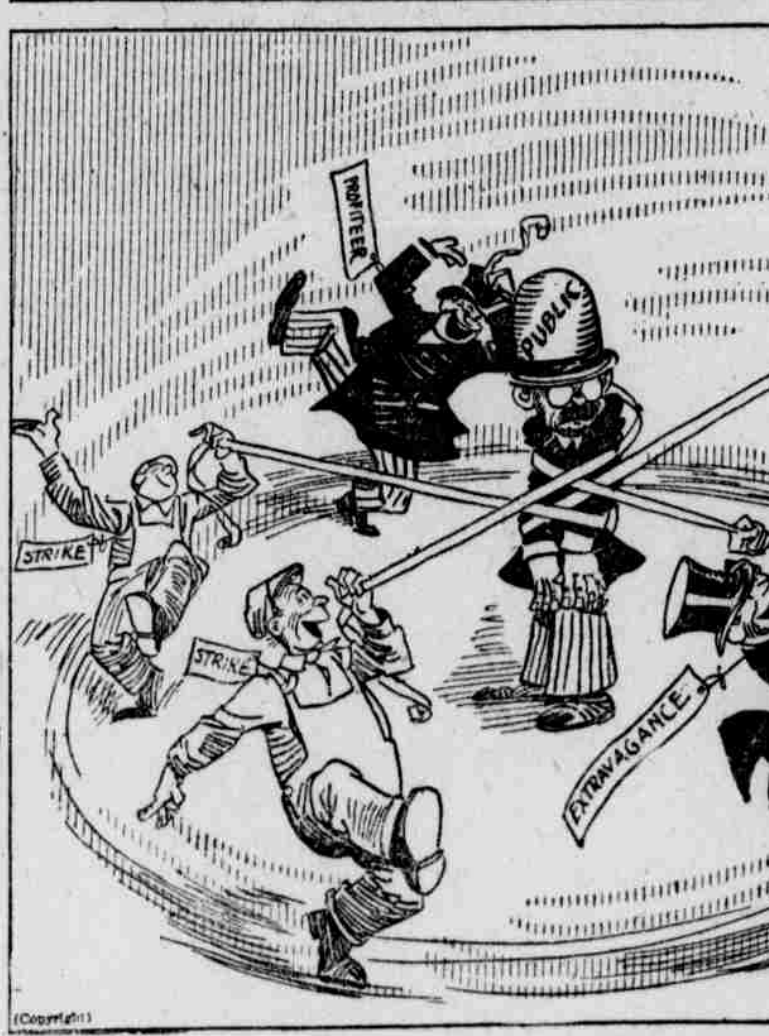
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The May Pole
