

M. I. T. ATHLETES ARE FAVORITES

Looked on as the Probable Winners of New England Intercollegiate

COMPETITIONS AT CAMBRIDGE, MASS.

Boston College Was Also a Strong Contender for First Place

Cambridge, Mass., May 21.—The New England intercollegiate track and field championships were begun to-day at Tech field with the preliminary events of the annual two-day meeting. Individual efforts were expected to reach high standards owing to keen competition among the colleges and the forthcoming selection of athletes for the Olympic team.

Massachusetts Institute of Technology, winner for the past three years, presented a team that was regarded as a strong contender. Boston college, winner two weeks ago of the eastern intercollegiate, had hopes of double honors. Williams, New Hampshire, Bowdoin and Bates sent athletes who were considered likely to group a good showing in points.

To-day's trials were for all events except the mile and two-mile runs. The weather was unsettled.

As Protest Against Additional Taxes on Cognac, Rum, Etc.

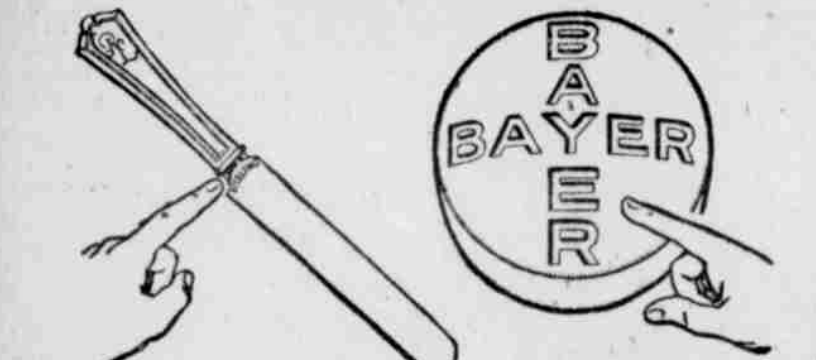

FOREST FIRES IN QUEBEC.

Threaten Destruction of Several Villages.

Quebec, May 21.—A forest fire is sweeping Beloeil county, threatening destruction of the villages of St. Camille, St. Fabien, Panet and Daquam, according to telegraphic appeals for aid received here yesterday. Daquam was said to be in great danger and the inhabitants were reported leaving their homes to escape the flames. Several scores of women and children were brought out of the fire district early yesterday by a Quebec Central train, which had to fight its way through the flames. Water had to be drawn from the tender to quench the flames which licked about the coaches as the train pushed through the burning woods.

Timber valued at more than \$1,000,000 is reported in the path of the flames. Public prayers are being offered by persons in the threatened districts that their homes be spared.

MARTIAL LAW ON IN MADRID

As Result of Disturbances Due to the Scarcity of Bread

POLICE AND CROWDS IN FOOD RIOTS

Mounted Police Used to Disperse Those Engaged in Demonstrations

Madrid, May 21 (By the Associated Press).—Martial law has been proclaimed here as the result of disturbances due to scarcity of bread.

Collisions occurred between police and crowds engaged in food riots yesterday. Mounted police rode among the people to disperse those engaging in demonstrations, and a number of arrests were made.

A government statement, announcing that martial law had been put into effect chronicled disturbances during which rioters pillaged shops, especially those of bakers and grocers. Some private houses were attacked.

The minister of the interior describes the labor movement throughout Spain as not distinctly socialistic, but of a syndicalist nature, with revolutionary tendencies. He declares the movement is being followed up by the socialists because they do not wish to lose touch with the mass of the workers.

VOLSTEAD ACT INVOKED.

South Londonderry Merchant Charged with a Violation.

Brattleboro, May 21.—D. L. Benson, a well-known South Londonderry merchant, was brought to Brattleboro yesterday by United States Marshal Arthur C. Carpenter of this place and arraigned before United States court on the charge of violating the Volstead act. He waived examination and was bound over to the present session of the United States court in Windsor in the sum of \$300. C. A. Boyden became surety for him.

Mr. Benson is charged with dispensing extracts and Jamaica ginger for beverage purposes.

DIRECT SEN. WALSH TO REPORT.

On the Print Paper Situation Within a Few Days

Washington, D. C., May 21.—The Senate manufactures sub-committee, investigating the print paper situation yesterday, directed Senator Walsh, Democrat, Massachusetts, to formulate a report which would be submitted in a few days for the committee's approval.

TO SEND TWO CREWS.

Union Boat Club Will Be Well Represented on Schuylkill.

Boston, May 21.—The Union Boat club will send its first and second crews to the American Henley race to be held on the Schuylkill river on May 28 and 29. It was announced to-day that because of the frequent wins by the second crew in tryouts with the first eight, the club had decided to send 16 oarsmen and later select the strongest combination obtainable.

INTEND TO HELP BOLSHEVIKI

Certain Elements in Germany Are Reported to Be So Minded

UPPER SILESIA IS A DANGER POINT

Germans Have Been Hauling Ammunition into Silesia

Warsaw, May 20 (By the Associated Press).—Information indicating that some elements in Germany are determined to help the Russian bolshevik continues to be received here, it is said in military circles. The latest report is regarding Upper Silesia, where German armed forces have been assembling on the border of the plebiscite area.

Newspapers here to-day published despatches stating that 4,000 security guards had arrived in Upper Silesia by special train.

For weeks, it is declared, Germans have been hauling ammunition into Silesia, hiding it beneath boats in railroad cars. Military authorities say the Germans are advertising their troop movements in this region for the purpose of compelling the Poles to transfer forces from the east and thus weaken the bolshevik front.

Warsaw papers recently printed reports that eight Zeppelins had crossed Poland headed eastward, and army headquarters afterwards confirmed this information. There is much speculation as to whether the Zeppelins bore officers en route to join the bolsheviks or were carrying away men named for extradition by the allies.

General Alexis A. Brusiloff, former commander-in-chief of Russian armies, is understood to have assumed command of the bolshevik offensive against Poland. In Polish military circles they say the soviet attack is designed to overrun Lithuania and extend the bolshevik front westward to East Prussia.

Military authorities here declare vast stores of munitions and supplies have arrived in East Prussia in anticipation of a break in the Polish front before the bolshevik offensive.

Fighting continues along the northern sectors of the front, but all soviet attacks have been repulsed along the upper branches of the Densina river, according to announcement.

MADE GOOD SLEUTHS.

Sinn Feiners Claim They are Quicker Than the Police.

Dublin, May 21.—The Sinn Feiners have again demonstrated that they are quicker than the police in catching criminals when they care to exercise their power.

Last night they took into custody four of seven men accused of raiding the residence of the duke de Stapoole, near Longwood, County Meath, and stealing from it a quantity of valuable silverware, oil paintings and other articles.

The Sinn Feiners declare that the other three men will be captured in a few days.

DANISH UNIONS FINED

For Being Responsible for Strike That Paralyzed Denmark's Export Trade.

Copenhagen, May 20.—Three trade unions which were found responsible for the strike which paralyzed Denmark's export trade for nearly two months, have been fined by the permanent court of arbitration an industrial dispute, a survey of the Cleveland garment industry by the Cleveland Garment Manufacturers' association shows.

The report says that there is a tendency to buy the less costly lines. No curtailment because of decreased demands is reported.

PRICES NOW AT THE TOP
