CAMP WESTMORE SOLD.

Bankrupt Owner Skipped Last Year Leaving Many Creditors. Newport, May 27.—Camp Westmore on Willoughby lake has been sold to R. R. Cookman, manager of a girls' camp at Lake Morey. Camp Westmore, a summer camp for girls, was founded by Mrs. Cookman in 1914. She had left it to her daughter, Mrs. J. H. Dudley, who had fitted it up in palatial fashion, doing business mainly on credit. She went bankrupt and disappeared before the season closed, leaving a large number of creditors amounting to about \$80,000, with assets of about \$3,000. Among the creditors were leading Chicago firms of Orleans, Barton and Newport.

At an auction sale the camp equipment was sold to B. O. Smith of Orleans and real estate was re-sold to R. R. Cookman immediately afterward. The camp will be managed this season by Charles H. Dudley of Hanover, N. H.

NEWPORT BOY'S BODY ARRIVES.

L. H. Bean, 21, Died in Service in France—Full Military Funeral To-day.

Newport, May 27.—The first body of a Newport boy soldier who died in service in France arrived here Tuesday morning. The body of L. H. Bean, 21, son of Mrs. Henry H. Bean, of Newport, was received here Tuesday morning. He was 21 years of age. He enlisted in the 13th regiment marine in June, 1918, and he died four months later of pleuro-pneumonia at Brest, where he was buried.

WELLS WILL SUSTAINED.

And Henry L. Ward is Thereby Made Residuary Legatee.

Burlington, May 27.—The will of Mrs. Effie E. P. Wells was sustained by a jury in Chittenden county court yesterday, making Henry L. Ward the residuary legatee of the Wells estate. The case has consumed almost the entire time of the court since March 27, when it began with the effort of Anna Wells Sykes and Hannah P. Wells to break the will of the late Mrs. E. P. Wells by the terms of which she left \$5,000 to Mrs. Charles Wells and an equal sum to her four children, \$30,000 apiece to the two children of Mrs. Anna Sykes to be given them when they become 45 years of age. The remainder of the money and estate was to go to Harry J. Talmadge, \$150,000 had been taken out for various bequests. The estimated value of what would go to Mr. Ward was near to the \$200,000 mark.

COUPLE TAKEN FROM TRAIN

And Man Was Held for Hearing Under White Slave Act.

Tillie Champagne of Lawrence, Mass., was bound over in \$100 bonds for appearance in the United States court at Windsor, following his preliminary hearing before the United States Commissioner Walter H. Cleary of Newport Monday on the charge of violating the Mann white slave traffic act, charged with transporting Mrs. Laura Walsh of Lowell, Mass., for immoral purposes. Mrs. Walsh was held under the same bond for the purpose of material in the case. E. J. Smith acted as counsel for the defendant, and Chief Immigration Inspector James C. Ford prosecuted the case.

The couple were taken from the Montreal-Boston train by Immigration officers for the purpose of determining whether or not they were U. S. citizens. The examination revealed that they had spent the past two weeks in Montreal and had registered at the Grand Union hotel there as man and wife. Both denied any commercial prostitution, but declared they had gone to the Canadian city for "a good time."

Mrs. Walsh testified that she had paid all of the expenses of the trip and that Champagne had accompanied her on the celebration after having urged him to declare the hand sold her home, which was located at a beach near Lowell, for \$500 and that she had decided to "blow" the money. When taken into custody she had but \$200 left. Mrs. Walsh furnished cash bail for both herself and Champagne.
