

# ALLIES TRY TO DECIDE SUM GERMANY SHALL BE COMPELLED TO GIVE UP

### An Important Conference Opened at Boulogne, France, Following the Arrival This Morning of Premiers Lloyd George and Millerand, Together With Marshal Foch and the French Finance Minister.

### GREECE OFFERS TO TAKE OVER THE ARMENIAN MANDATE

### Italy Will Ask for 20 Per Cent of the Reparation Which Germany Will Make—The Treatment of Russia Is Expected to Be One of the Chief Matters Under Discussion.

Boulogne, June 21. (By The Associated Press).—Premiers Lloyd George and Millerand, accompanied by Marshal Foch and Frederic Francois-Marsal, French minister of finance, arrived here this morning from Folkestone. In the party was Premier Venizelos of Greece. The arrival of the two premiers completes the delegations which will participate in the conversations here today and to-morrow, the Italian and Belgian representatives having arrived during the night.

Immediately after their arrival, the delegates held a short preliminary conference.

M. Venizelos will participate in the sessions at which questions of Turkey and Armenia are discussed.

Questions relative to reparations and Russia are expected to be the two most difficult problems of the conference. British delegates still maintain a strong attitude regarding the manner in which the allies should deal with Germany on reparations.

The only clause involved in execution of the treaty of Versailles on which the conferees are in perfect agreement is that relative to the disarmament of Germany.

Premier Venizelos will formally offer, in behalf of Greece, to take the mandate for Armenia.
