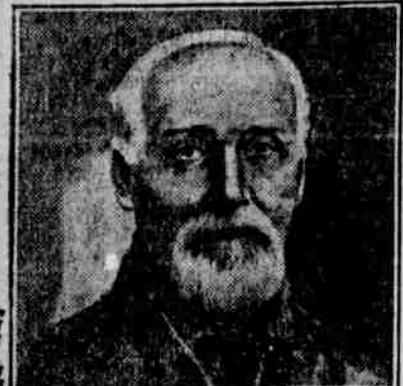

Mrs. Francis Ingraham is spending a few days with her mother, Mrs. Culver, in Richford.

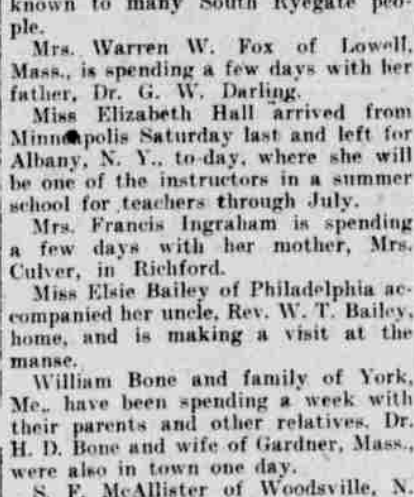
Miss Elsie Bailey of Philadelphia accompanied her uncle, Rev. W. T. Bailey, home, and is making a visit at the manse.
