 Election passed off very quietly yesterday, with no special events save the fact that of the 98 women who were entitled to vote, 75 took advantage of the opportunity. Three ballots were necessary to elect a representative, Fred F. Pirie, whose postoffice address is Grassville and who was the Democratic nominee, winning out in the third over C. W. Cram, the regular nominee of the Republicans. George T. Colby, the last representative, also received the votes of a solid block of supporters, throughout the three ballots his vote standing at 59, 63 and 58 for the series. Cram received the highest number on the first ballot but lost on later ones, his vote for the three being 79, 49 and 24. Pirie held well on the second ballot and made a substantial gain on the third, his vote being 77, 75 and 103 for the last. At the announcement of the deciding vote, Mr. Pirie was called for and responded briefly, thanking his townsmen for the honor and promising to represent them to the best of his ability.
 Complete returns are not at hand on the national state and county tickets, but it is expected that the returns will show a substantial majority. Porter H. Dale received 199 votes against his Democratic competitor. In the vote for United States senator, Dillingham received 209 votes to 38 for Shaw. The vote for president will be about 204 for Harding and 38 for Cox.
 Robert Kynoch has bought the house just south of the one he now occupies of Mrs. Anna Hutchinson, and will occupy it this fall. The present tenant is H. O. Anderson, whose plans for moving are not yet announced.

 Still the road projects under construction continue to be reported to the state highway commissioner, in spite of the lateness of the season. These include Georgia, one-half mile of highway. Sheldon and Fletcher are also doing some work, and a culvert is being constructed in Montgomery.

Biscuits
 2 cups flour
 4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1 tablespoon shortening
 1/2 cup milk or half milk and half water
 Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Add shortening and rub in very lightly; add liquid slowly; roll or pat on floured board to about one inch in thickness (handle as little as possible); cut with biscuit cutter. Bake in hot oven 15 to 20 minutes.

Royal Cinnamon Buns
 2 1/2 cups flour
 1 teaspoon Royal Baking Powder
 1/2 teaspoon shortening
 1 egg
 1/2 cup water
 1 cup sugar
 2 teaspoons cinnamon
 4 tablespoons seeded raisins
 Sift 2 tablespoons of measured sugar with flour, salt and baking powder; rub shortening in lightly; add beaten egg to water and add slowly. Roll out 1/4 inch

Parker House Rolls
 4 cups flour
 1 teaspoon salt
 2 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
 2 tablespoons shortening
 1 1/2 cups milk
 Sift flour, salt and baking powder together. Add melted shortening to milk and add slowly to dry ingredients stirring until smooth. Knead lightly on floured board and roll out 1/4 inch thick. Cut with biscuit cutter. Crease each creche with back of knife one inch apart in greased pan. Allow to stand 15 minutes in warm place. Brush each with melted butter and bake in moderate oven 15 to 20 minutes.
