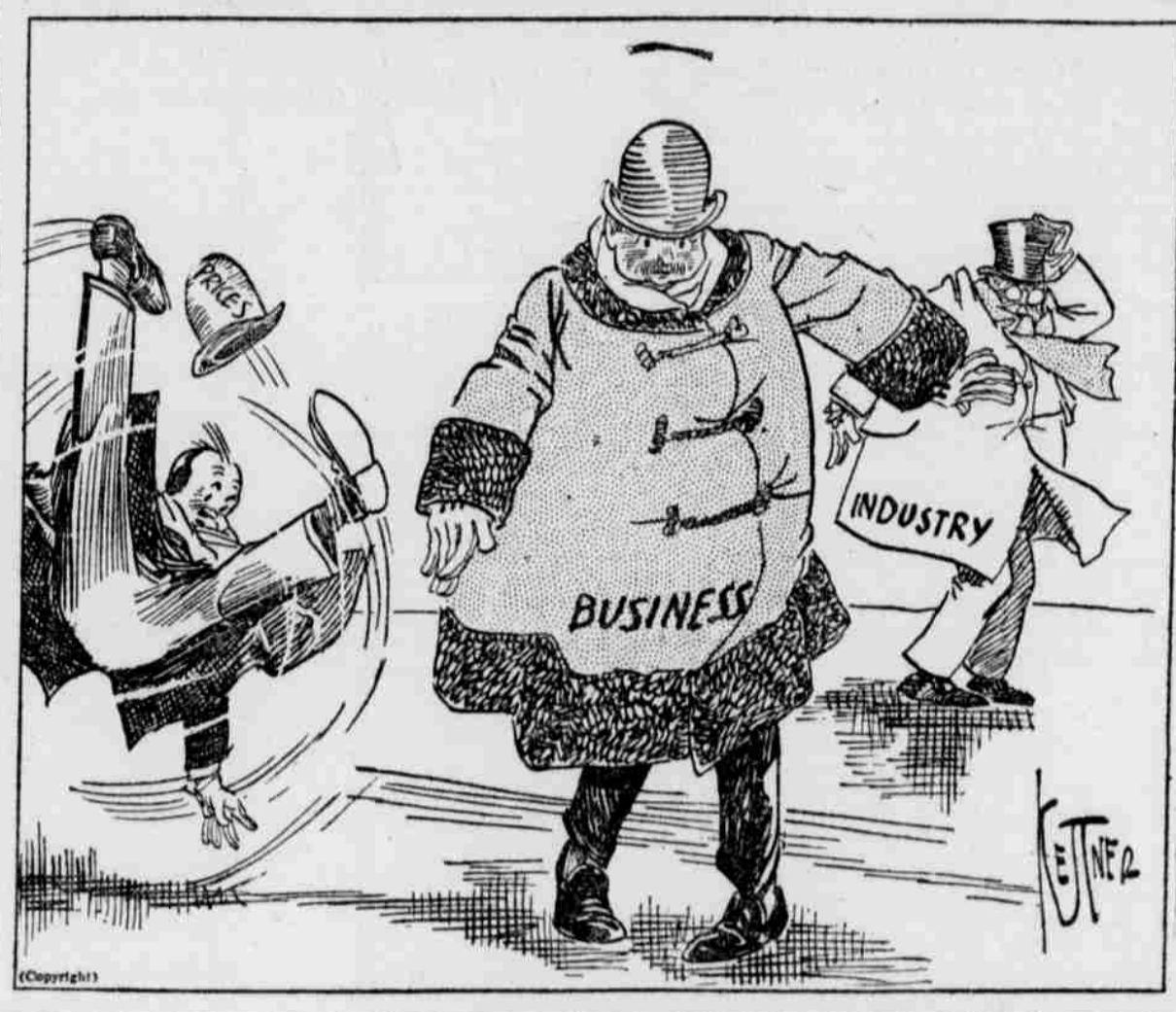
Inappropriate for Ornament. Everett, aged six, had been left with a neighbor while mama and papa attended amateur theatricals.
