

NEW MINORITY LEADER BETTER

Representative Kitchin of North Carolina Is Recovering TO RESUME SEAT AT EXTRA SESSION And Will Assume Leadership Recently Held By Champ Clark

Washington, D. C., March 3.—Democratic members of the House were advised today that Representative Kitchin of North Carolina, who became minority leader of the House yesterday through the death of Representative Champ Clark, was rapidly recovering from his recent illness and would be able to resume his seat at the extra session to be called probably in April.

CHAMP CLARK WAS COMMANDING FIGURE

Leader of Democratic Party in the House And Long in Public Life.

Washington, D. C., March 3.—Champ Clark died yesterday at 2:10 p. m. in his 71st year and within two days of his retirement from the House of Representatives after a service of 26 years. Death was due to an attack of pleurisy and a complication of disease incident to his advanced age. Up to ten days ago, however, when he developed a severe cold, Mr. Clark had shared actively in proceedings of the House as Democratic leader.

Immediately after the death of Mr. Clark was announced, the House recessed for 30 minutes. Representative Rucker, Democrat, Missouri, who made the announcement, said it was Mr. Clark's wish, as expressed through his son, that there be no interruption of Congress in its closing days.

To his last conscious moments, the former speaker's mind was engrossed with memories of his long legislative career. Just before he lapsed into final unconsciousness yesterday, those at his bedside heard him whisper, "The question is on the adoption of the conference report," the words with which the speaker brings to its final conclusion in the House the fight on any bill. At Mr. Clark's bedside when the end came were Mrs. Clark, their son, Bennett Clark, and their daughter, Mrs. James M. Thomson of New Orleans. Arrangements for the funeral have not been completed, but the body probably will be sent to the old home in Bowling Green, Mo., where the former speaker

had expected to retire after the end of his congressional service. Mr. Clark presided over the House throughout the World war, relinquishing the speakership after eight years when the Republicans regained control last year as a result of their victories in the 1918 congressional elections. He then was chosen as Democratic leader in the House.

During the present session it was apparent that his health was failing. He walked slowly with a dragging step. While he usually was on the floor and followed proceedings closely he rarely engaged in debate. On one or two occasions, however, he spoke at some length on important questions. Close friends believe his death was hastened by the death a year ago of his only grandchild, Champ Clark Thomson, three-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. James M. Thomson. He was passionately fond of his grandson and associates say that after the child's death they noticed a perceptible change in his condition, which in the spring of 1920 alarmed the family.

Champ Clark was educated in the common schools of Kentucky, University of Kentucky, Bethany college and the Cincinnati law school. He was president of Marshall college, West Virginia, 1873-4, admitted to the bar in 1875; city attorney of Louisiana, Mo., member of Missouri House of Representatives, 1889-91; member of the 53d and 55th to 66th Congresses, ninth Missouri district; permanent chairman of Democratic national convention, St. Louis, 1904; minority leader of second session of the 60th and 61st Congresses; speaker of 62d, 63d, 64th and 65th Congresses. Democratic minority leader of 63th Congress.

It is not necessary here to recall Champ Clark's rather tempestuous political career. Some of his work in his position on certain questions were bitterly resented and soundly condemned—his desire to annex Canada and his pro-German leaning in the war in particular. He had a large taste for figures, a certain grasp of economics and extraordinary memory for detail. It was not until he had rendered long service in the House that he achieved his ambition to become a member of the committee on ways and means, but once there he amply demonstrated his capacity for work. As a cross-examiner of witnesses he was incisive and penetrating, and when the tariff bill was under consideration he rendered valuable service not only to his party but often to the Republican chairman as well.

They were accompanied by their grandfather, Colonel John Coolidge, of Plymouth, Vt., who arrived here yesterday. Mayor M. J. B. & A. RAILROAD REDUCE WAGES

Amount of Cut Will Be Effective April 4 and Will Be Known Then

ABOUT 1,800 MEN ARE AFFECTED

The Reduction Is Confined to Ununiformed Employes

Boston, March 3.—The Boston and Albany railroad today announced a reduction in wages to various classes of ununiformed employes aggregating 1,800 men. The amount of the reduction which will be effective April 4 will be made known at conferences with the employes on March 8.

Those effected will be freight handlers, truckers, sealers, scalers, stowers, cooper, baggage porters, janitors, watchmen, drawtenders, crossing men, grain shovelers, lampmen, mail porters, pumpmen, station cleaners, fire builders, ash pit men, flue borers, coalers, car cleaners, headlight men, sandhouse men, lamp lighters, trackmen, apprentices, storemen and all others rated as unskilled labor.

Notices posted at shops and other places on the lines to-day said: "This is a 30 days' notice to the above-mentioned classes of employes that effective April 4, 1921, the management intends to reduce the rates of pay but in the meantime will be glad to have a conference with the duly accredited representatives of the employes concerned for the purpose of arriving at an understanding in regard to the changes proposed."

FOUND WRECKAGE OF 17 AUTOMOBILES

At the Base of Cliff Overlooking Lake Erie—Machines Probably Had Been Stolen.

Buffalo, N. Y., March 3.—The finding of the wrecks of seventeen automobiles at the foot of a cliff on the west shore of Lake Erie, a few miles west of Buffalo, has convinced the police that companies insuring against theft have been systematically cheating. Insurance companies, in self-defense, are carefully examining candidates for insurance of this kind. In this lake shore graveyard of automobiles are makes of many sorts, from the plain runabout up to the pretentious limousine. Marks on the edge of the 85-foot cliff and the condition of the machines indicate that the automobiles were set afire before being sent over.

The theory of the police is that the machines were stolen from their owners, insured against theft under fictitious names, reported stolen so that the insurance could be collected and then destroyed to prevent detection for theft. Police records show that in three months, 484 cars were stolen, 41 of which were found burned or destroyed and 108 are still listed as missing.

ANTI-LEPROSY FIGHT.

Is Being Carried on Through Production of Special Plants.

Washington, D. C., March 3.—Propagation of plants for production of vegetable oils used in the fight against leprosy has been undertaken by the department of agriculture. Seeds of the hydrocarpus anthelmintica tree, forwarded from Bangkok, Siam, by Dr. J. F. Rock of the University of Hawaii will be sent to Florida, Porto Rico and Hawaii for the purpose.

Recent progress in the anti-leprosy crusade through use of chaulmoogra oil, obtained from a tree grown in Burma, prompted the new effort. Experts of the department, working since 1904, have succeeded in producing a similar oil from seeds of three other trees including the variety received from Bangkok and hope to supply the doctors with an additional weapon in their fight against the disease.
