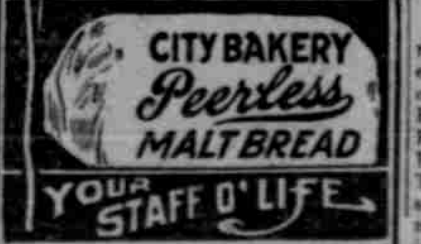
Ross Gale of Plainfield was in the city yesterday.
