

MORE MILLS RESTORE WAGES

Monomac, Acadia and Katama Follow Pacific Mills Lead

SCALE EFFECTIVE NEXT MONDAY

More Than 75 Per Cent of Lawrence Workers Are Affected

Lawrence, Mass., Aug. 25.—Notice was posted at the Katama mill to-day that the rate of wages paid before the reduction that led to the textile strike would become effective beginning next Monday.

With this announcement, it was estimated that more than 75 per cent of the textile workers who have been on strike since late in March had been offered their old wages. The Monomac Spinning company, the Acadia mill and the Pacific mills company had previously announced restoration of the former scale.

Russia Buys Meat in Argentina.

Moscow, Aug. 1.—The Russian government Grain Produce company has purchased 2,000,000 pounds of meat in the Argentine, paying 500,000 gold rubles in cash, and the balance in Russian raw products, according to local newspapers.

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DOWN TO SEMI-FINALS.

In National Doubles Lawn Tennis Championship Play.

Boston, Aug. 25.—The semi-final round of the national doubles lawn tennis championship to be decided on the courts of the Longwood Cricket club to-day had two interesting groups of opponents. In one, the first four ranking singles players of the country were brought together, paired as doubles combinations, the playing-through titlists, W. T. Tilden, 24, and Vincent Richards, ranking respectively 1 and 3, and the opposing combination of William M. Johnston and Wallace I. Johnston, being composed of the number 2 and number 4 players. The foreign strength remaining in the tournament was concentrated in the other match with the Australian Davis cup team of Gerald L. Patterson and Pat O'Hara Wood opposed by Jean Borotra, France, and N. W. Niles, a Bostonian.

SARAZEN WON THE MATCH.

He and Ouimet Defeat Hagen and Kirkwood 3 and 2.

Newton, Mass., Aug. 25.—Gene Sarazen, national open golf champion and Francis Ouimet, former national amateur and open champion, defeated Walter Hagen, British open champion and Joe Kirkwood, Australian expert, 3 and 2 in an 18 hole match at the Charles River Country club yesterday.

Sarazen actually won the match unaided, as his own ball was one up on the opposing pair. His card of 72 broke the record of 75 for the new and difficult course, made recently by Ouimet.

Series at the Polo Grounds May Decide American League Race

ST. LOUIS ONLY HALF GAME AHEAD

In National League the Giants Add Another Notch to Lead

New York, Aug. 25.—Twenty hits off three Red Sox pitchers enabled the St. Louis Americans to defeat the Bostonians, 13 to 2, and keep pace with the New York club which found its batting eyes after two days and took the final of the Cleveland series 7 to 3. To-day the Browns, with only a game lead, and the Yankees meet in a series at the Polo grounds that may decide the league race.

Walker Johnson, Washington veteran, added another shutout to his long record, holding the White Sox to five scattered hits and winning 1 to 0. His mound opponent, Blankenship, though allowing but four hits was hit for two in the second frame, which coupled with a stolen base by Shanks and a wild pitch accounted for the only score.

Detroit and Philadelphia engaged in an extra-base hitting contest, Detroit winning 11 to 8. Heilmann, Walker and Hauser hit homers. Walker's was his 31st of the season. Blue added three runs to his long season's string. In their National league the Giants



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gained another notch on the Cardinals by defeating Cincinnati 2 to 1 with the aid of Jess Barnes' pitching while the St. Louisans were losing a wild scoring game to the Braves, 12 to 11. The Pirates continued on their winning way, trouncing the Phillies, 10 to 4. Alexander held Brooklyn to four hits and the Cubs won their first game in the week, 4 to 1.
