School has begun again for another year. The children should have a good place to study and to prepare their school work.

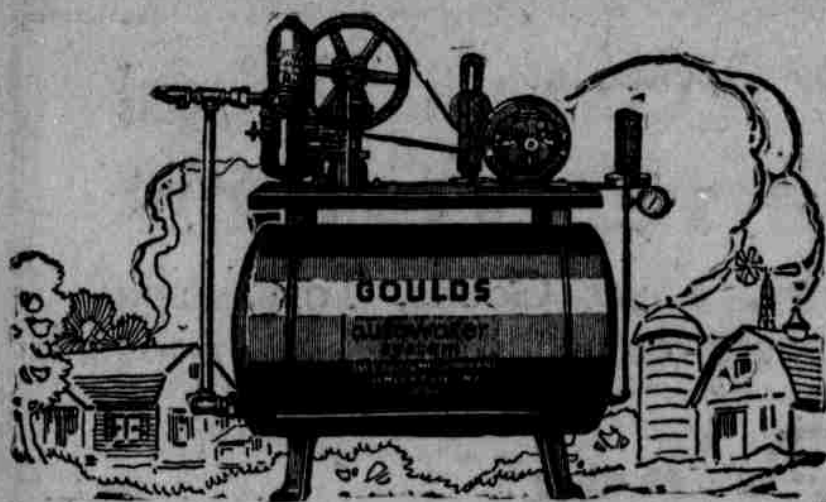

DISTRICT OF LAMOILLE. From 1878 to 1922, a period of forty-four years, this court has had four judges, none of whom were lawyers.
