New Brunswick, N. J., Sept. 18.—The question of where Rev. Edward W. Hall, rector of the fashionable church of St. John the Evangelist, and his choir leader, Mrs. James Mills, wife of the sexton, were slain shared interest with that of by whom they were slain...

The theory that the rector and his choir leader had been slain elsewhere, and the bodies removed to Somerset county to complicate the investigation, was based chiefly on conditions at the spot where they were found.

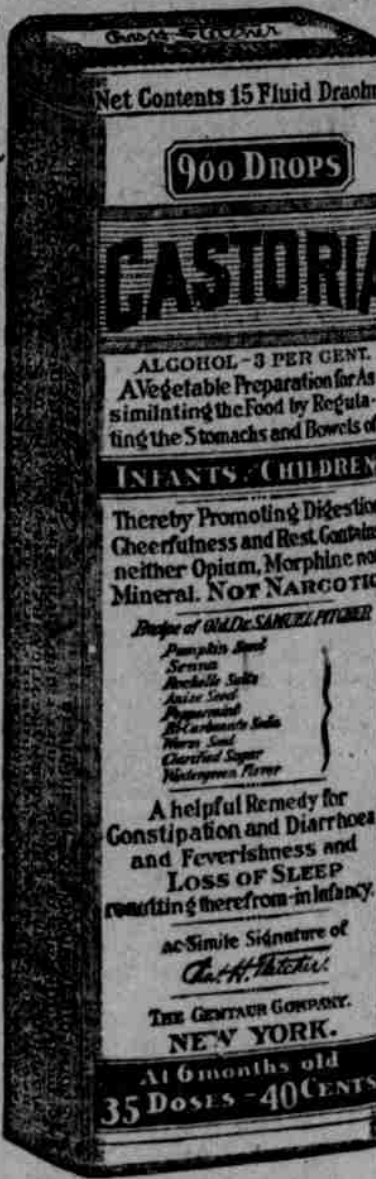
