BISHOP HUGHES "GAS" STOLEN.
Both In Going to and Coming from Church Service.

New Haven, Conn., Dec. 18.—Bishop Edwin H. Hughes of the Methodist Episcopal church showed himself to be an optimist concerning automobiles when he spoke at Center church yesterday afternoon. The bishop arrived at the church twenty minutes late because the gasoline supply had been stolen from the automobile, in which he started for the church from the home of Dean Charles R. Brown of the Yale divinity school.

In his speech Bishop Hughes declared he did not think the automobile was a source of evil. He declared church members years ago looked upon skating rinks and bicycles as obstacles in the path of the church, but time has changed that view.

After the service a local clergyman offered to take Bishop Hughes from the church in his automobile but the machine would not start and it was found that seven gallons of gasoline had been taken from the car during the church service.

DOLLAR DROPS.

On German Market and Germans are Jubilant.

Berlin, Dec. 18. (By the Associated Press).—In the midst of their Christmas shopping, German consumers were jubilant today at the unprecedented drop in the dollar in the course of five days. This rise in the mark has already produced a drop of from 10 to 25 per cent in wholesale market prices. The retailers are reluctant to make reductions because they are stocked up with goods bought when the mark was much lower.

The announcement of New York's closing rate of exchange Saturday turned Sunday into a busy day at home for all the house traders, who were computing overnight the amount of their gains, while the telephones of banking officials were swamped with inquiries regarding the prospects of exchange.

STILL OPERATORS KILLED.

Bodies of Two Men Found After Fire Destroyed House.

Pittsburgh, Dec. 18.—Fire, believed to have been started when a still exploded, caused the death of two men at Milltown, near North Bessemer, today.

Members of a Union railroad freight train crew discovered the blaze. They stopped the train and tried to extinguish the fire. When the walls caved in, the railroaders searched the ruins. They found the body of George Petrovich lying over the copper "sworn" of a still. John Bunko also was burned to death.

STRIKE LEADERS BARRED.

From Re-employment in Baden, Germany, Aneline Works.

Berlin, Dec. 18.—The strike in the Baden aneline works at Ludwigshafen, which was begun November 28, was settled today. All the workmen will be re-employed except the strike leaders, it was announced. The strike was due to the discharge of three members of the workmen's factory council. The dismissal of the three men was upheld by a decision of the trades union arbitration board.
