Wednesday is payday and we are looking forward with eager eyes for the 52 cents a day.

Wagoner Gomez has been busy all day in unloading provisions from one of the cars at the fort. There was a whole carload of hardtack, bacon, beans and coffee for each company, and one man from each company was detailed to help unload them.

To Cut Off Blanco.

Great Battleship The Alabama Launched.

Battle Reported to Have Taken Place--No News of Spanish Fleet Since Sunday.

Philippines Must Change Hands.

Must Cut off Blanco.

WASHINGTON, May 18.—The complete isolation of Blanco from the outside world is the next most essential move on the part of the United States and it will be executed at the earliest possible moment. It is known that there has been a communication by cable with Madrid and also with the Admiral of the Spanish Squadron. It was all done through three cables leaving Santiago. Active steps to cut these cables are now being taken, and if they succeed Spain will receive the hardest blow yet struck in Cuba. Blanco will then be cut off from the whole world and can be starved into submission, and the first notice he will have of the approaching American fleet will be a hurricane of shot and shell that will drive him from Havana into the greedy arms of the Cuban patriots.

New Battleship.

PHILADELPHIA, May 18.—The battleship Alabama has been completed and was launched at the Cramps navy yard at 1 o'clock today. She is larger than the Oregon and it is expected she will be fully as effective. She mounts four 13-inch guns, eight 8-inch guns and four 6-inch. The displacement is 11,000 tons. It will be remembered that the construction of this huge battleship has been delayed a whole year by the failure of Congress to provide for the purchase of her armor.

Pennsylvania Regiment to Philippines.

WASHINGTON, May 18.—Gen. Miles said today that the 10th Pennsylvania regiment would be ordered to San Francisco soon to be in readiness for the expedition to the Philippines. This statement conflicts with the heretofore prevalent belief that only the regiments from the Pacific coast would have an opportunity to be a part of the expedition.

Volunteers on the Way.

NEW YORK, May 18.—The First regiment of New Hampshire volunteers passed through Jersey City this morning en route for Chattanooga. One man deserted by dropping from the car at West Point. His absence was not discovered for some time so that he has not been captured.

Battle off Santa Clara.

LONDON, May 18.—According to a special despatch from Havana there has been an engagement off the port of the Caribbean province of Santa Clara, and it is alleged that the American landing party was repulsed. Nothing definite was known at the time of the despatch as to the extent of the battle or its importance, but it is thought the information was correct.

Must Keep Secret.

NEW YORK, May 18.—The Commercial Cable Co. to-day sent out the following notice: "The United States authorities declare all messages containing any information of the prospective movements of the current military operations as inimical to the United States and is consequently forbidden. Newspaper correspondents are requested not to include such matter in their messages, and if such is found it will be stricken out by a censor."

Arsenal Shops Open.

PITTSBURG, Pa., May 18.—After an idleness of 30 years the shops at the Allegheny arsenal started today with a large force of men to make leather goods for the volunteer army.

Off For Manila.

VALLEJO, Cal., May 18.—The cruiser Charleston will probably leave today for the Philippines. The coal, ammunition and supplies are all aboard.

Otis Arrives.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 18.—Major General Otis, second in command to Merritt in the Philippines, has arrived with his staff.

Gladstone Nearer Death.

HAWARDEN, May 18.—At 10 o'clock this morning Gladstone was in a comatose condition bordering on the brink of death. His family believe that it is now only a question of hours. His condition at noon was slightly weaker.

The Oregon is Safe.

WASHINGTON, May 18.—The Oregon is believed to be safe and probably now a part of Sampson's fleet.

Spain Must Leave Philippines

VICTORIA, B. C., May 18.—J. Stuart Jones the Manila sugar king and merchant prince arrived here today en route for London on an alleged mission of representing to the British Foreign office the hopes and wishes of the Philippine commercial community. He says that all business in the island must remain at a standstill until assurances are given that some foreign power will assume the destinies of the island. Many of the successful residents are in favor of throwing off the yoke of Spain as too incompetent and unstable for an effective self government. A strong party in Japan is said to be trying to force the Premier into the affair. He declines.

William Steele Indicted.

PHILADELPHIA, May 18.—The grand jury of the United States District Court has found a true bill of indictment against William Steele, formerly cashier of the Chestnut Street National Bank, covering 122 counts. He was charged with aiding and abetting W. M. Singerley in misapplying funds embezzling and mailing false orders.

Alger—Pike Wedding.

WASHINGTON, May 18.—Frances Alger, daughter of the secretary of war, and Charles Burrill Pike were married today at the home of the secretary. The President and Vice President and their wives were present.

Second New York Leaves.

NEW YORK, May 18.—The Second New York provisional regiment under Col. Hardin left Camp Black today for the south.

The Columbia at Delaware.

DELAWARE BREAKWATER, May 18.—The cruiser Columbia arrived here at noon today.

No News of Spanish Fleet.

PORT AU PRINCE, May 18.—Nothing is known here of the report that the Spanish Cape Verde fleet is now at San Juan. The last news of them was Sunday, when they left Curacao.
