Strawberries for Market.

It certainly does not pay well to grow strawberries for market in the ordinary way. You might make a cent a quart or less, but that hardly pays.

The so-called matted row system produces berries cheaply, but they sell cheaply, too. One of the great secrets of profitable production is the producing a better article than that which is usually sent to the market.

Late Forage Crops.

Most farmers get through haying about July 20 to 30. Then there is time to put some forage crop, but few know what to put in so late.

Emergency Crops.

Not for many years, if ever, has there been such continuous and protracted rainfall at this season of the year as we have experienced during the months of May and June.

Owing to the excessive rains there are many the millets and potatoes that have failed to grow and hundreds of acres intended for these crops that have not been in condition to plant with any crop from this same reason.

If these crops are sown in such a way as to produce a maximum yield it will be better to plow and seed to grass after the crop is taken off than to undertake to seed with the crop.

Catch Crops.

On almost every farm in the country there are spots every year which do not produce anything because of some accident of weather or season.

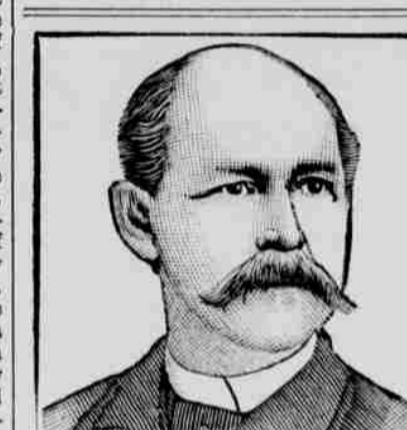
