MAD WOMEN STOP MINERS AT WORK

Throw Stones and Red Pepper. Wreck Motor Cars and Seize Dinner Pails.

PITTSBURG, Kan., Dec. 13.—Several thousand militant women marchers of the Kansas coal field went into action today and stopped miners from working at three mines of the Central Coal and Coke Co. Several motor cars were wrecked and several persons were injured. The women threw stones and red pepper. They seized dinner buckets from 85 miners and then threw the contents upon the miners and officers.

Famous French General Who Commanded Greatest Army in World's History Given Vermont Welcome in Brattleboro as Guest of Brattleboro Post—Governor Hartness and Staff and Leading State Department Officials Present

MARSHAL FOCH'S ADDRESS IN FRENCH GIVEN IN ENGLISH BY INTERPRETER

About 500 Legion Men and Members of Auxiliary Present, Most of Them Coming by Special Train from Various Parts of State—Visiting Legionnaires Given Luncheon in Masonic Temple, Where Governor Hartness Speaks

Vermont officially welcomed in Brattleboro this morning, through its American Legion men and through its distinguished governor, the commander of the allied armies in the World war—Marshal Ferdinand Foch of France, the most noted man who ever visited Brattleboro.

To see and hear the supreme commander of the greatest armies in history was a rare privilege, and those who were so fortunate as to be accorded that opportunity are indeed grateful to the American Legion, which made possible the events of this morning.

Unmindful of all others, the gaze of each one in the vast crowd was fixed upon the great military leader as he appeared through the doorway at the railroad station, and the instant he came in sight there was tremendous cheering. He was dressed in the regulation French military uniform suited to a man of his rank, with long blue overcoat. Although 71 1/2 years of age he appeared much younger, and while he is small in stature the square set jaw and determined expression of his countenance told plainly why he was chosen as the generalissimo of the armies which accomplished the defeat of Germany and her allies.

Besides Marshal Foch and the others mentioned there were on the platform some prominent officials of the Vermont department and some members of the Foch party which has been on a 25,000-mile tour of the United States, including Franklin D'Olier, past national commander of the American Legion.

The plaza at the foot of Main street and the sections of Vermont street and Hill street adjacent to the union railroad station was the scene of the state welcome, and that section began filling up about 7 o'clock. A few Legion officials came last night, but the bulk of the legionnaires came on a special train from St. Albans which arrived here at 6.30 o'clock this morning. This train brought about 350, while others came by automobile from nearby places like Putney, Hines, Winchester and Keese. Probably 500 American Legion men were in the audience.

The Brattleboro Military band and company I of the 172d Infantry met in their respective headquarters and the Legion men and members of the Ladies' auxiliary of the Legion assembled in front

Engineer on Foch Train Son of West Brattleboro Woman

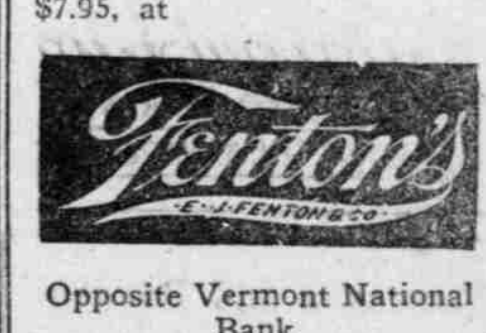
