Today's Anniversaries. 1775—Philander Chase, first Episcopal bishop of Ohio and afterward bishop of Illinois, born at Cornish, N. H. Died at Robin's Nest, Ill., Sept. 20, 1852.

1790—George Washington, first President of the United States, died at Mount Vernon, Va., Feb. 22, 1792.

1814—U. S. Congress levied duties on carriages and harness, except those exclusively employed in husbandry.

1840—Stephen A. Douglas was elected United States senator from Illinois.

1860—Lewis Cass resigned as Secretary of State in the Buchanan cabinet.

1861—Prince Albert, consort of Queen Victoria, died at Windsor Castle, born near Coburg, Aug. 26, 1819.

1871—George H. Williams of Oregon became Attorney-General in Grant's cabinet.

1892—The Cincinnati presbytery suspended the Rev. Prof. Henry P. Smith for alleged heresy.

In The Day's News. Thomas Nicholson, the new president of the Anti-Saloon League of America, has been a bishop of the Methodist Episcopal church since 1916.

A native of Ontario, he attended the Normal school in Toronto and subsequently graduated from Northwestern University and the Garrett Biblical Institute.

After five years as a school teacher he entered the ministry in 1884, and since that time has steadily risen in influence as well as an official rank.

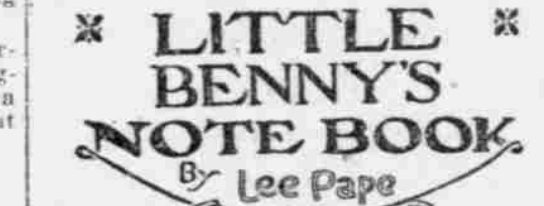

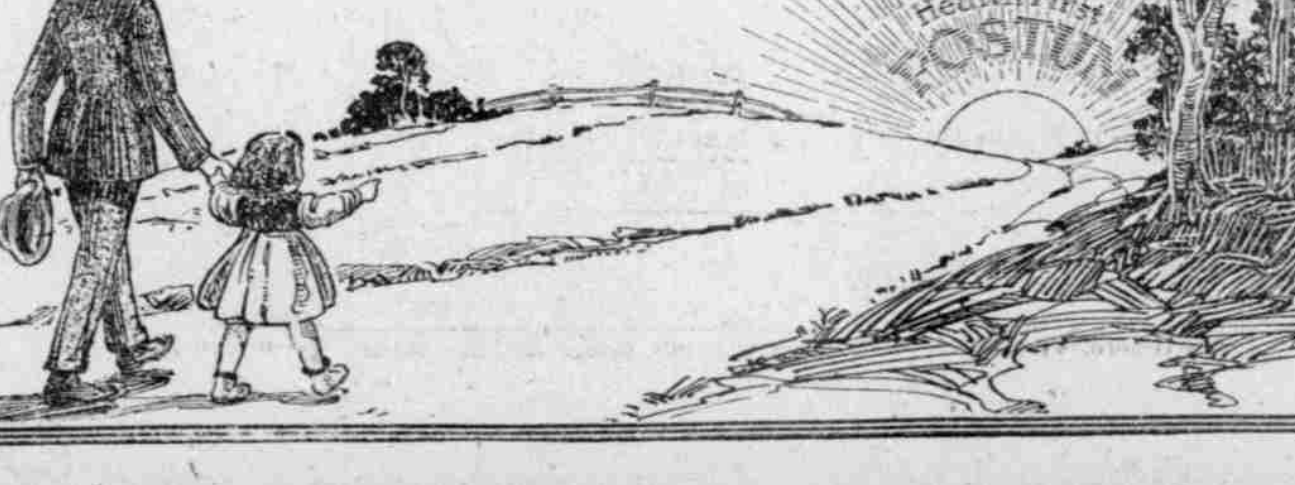

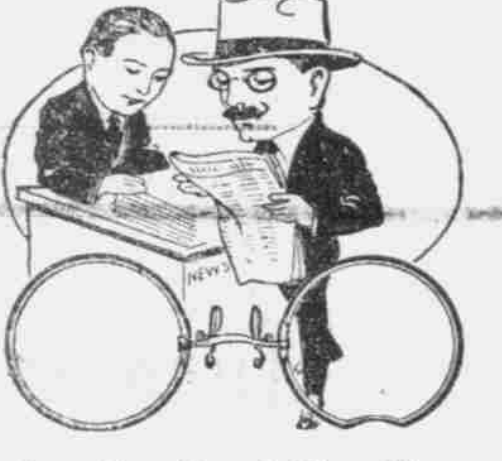
