TOWNSHEND. Missionary Pageant Presented. The missionary pageant given by the girls of the World Wide guild Tuesday evening was a unique entertainment and proved a pleasing success. The plot showed a scene in a church with two women dressed in the costume of 50 years ago. The time was 1871 and the first Baptist Women's Missionary society had just been organized. As in a vision "Such Stuff as Dreams Are Made Of" there appeared a band of girls of the present day who told of the work and success of the World Wide guild and planned to talk with a freedom which shocked the women of the older generation. The parts of the present day girls were taken by Misses Beatrice Cummings, Mabel and Elaine Townsend, Ruth Sparks and Doris Tenney. The girls of 50 years ago were Miss Eunice Heath and Miss Marion Cummings. As the guild gathered about the table the missionary song, "We Are Coming from Afar," was sung in an adjoining room and representatives from Africa, China, Japan, India, Egypt, Russia and Alaska, all in costume, entered and surrounded the working girls, who presented the verse was sung in chorus. Besides the pageant the program included a piano solo by Miss Clara Greenwood; song, "Rockaway Baby," Helen Nobs; with doll recitation, "The Old World's Progress," Miss Mary Wright; song in costume, "The Jap Doll," Elaine Columbus; recitation, a story based on Judges 1:12-13, Margaret Boyden; acting, Rose, Rose, Rose, Electa Blood. Ice cream was sold by the girls after the entertainment and games were played under the guidance of Miss Cummings of Brattleboro, who was present for the evening. About 825 was cleared.
