PRESENTS FUEL SITUATION.

The fuel question, as expounded by Mr. Daniels also was of much timely interest. Mr. Daniels stated that the needs of the town were about 13,000 tons of hard coal. According to the Pennsylvania Fuel commission, our largest coal producer, the amount of coal that we bought last year, on April 1, 1921, there were 3,000 tons of hard coal in the local dealers' bins; this year at the same date there were less than 1,000 tons, partially due to the fact that the dealers found it unprofitable to pay taxes on coal which the state taxed under the law.

However, we don't anticipate much trouble in keeping warm this winter if the people will be honest. The local coal dealers, E. B. Barrows and L. B. Yauvey, are honest in the delivery of coal, and if the people will be honest in their dealers as far as their wants are concerned, there will be no difficulty. It is a good idea for everyone not to use hard coal at least in the winter months.

During the next 30 to 40 days, Mr. Daniels said, the situation regarding coal will probably be somewhat relieved as more coal cars will be released for use here in the East by the expiration of that time.
