GREAT EXPLOSION IMPRISONS MINERS

Between 90 and 95 Men Entombed in Pennsylvania Coal Mine

MINE SHAFT STILL IN RUNNING ORDER

One of Main Entries of Mine Blocked About 500 Feet from Bottom Shaft—Rescue Party Organized and Begins Work at Once.

SPANGLAR, Pa., Nov. 6. (Associated Press.)

A terrific explosion somewhere in the workings in the Reilly mine of the Reilly Coal Co. here at 7.30 o'clock this morning entombed between 90 and 95 miners who had gone to their work scarcely half an hour before.
