BORDER RUFFIANISM. A recent letter of Rev Mr. Nutt to a gentleman in Boston, gives the following account of the outrages of the Mis-ourians at the time of their departure from the vicinity of Lawrence.

He was harnessing his horse when he saw them approaching; a squad of "Kickapoo rangers." He fled as fast as his lameness would permit, into his cornfield; they pursued, overtook him and shot him through the bowels.

John Kilburn, the first civilized inhabitant of Walpole, was a descendant in the fifth generation from Thomas Kilburn, the common ancestor of all the Kilburns in America, who embarked from London to this country in the ship Increase, April 15, 1635, and settled in Westchester, Ct.

John Kilburn was born at Glastenbury, Ct., in 1704. He married Mehitable Bacon, of Middletown, Ct., Oct. 26, 1732. In 1737, about which time his wife died, he sold his land in Connecticut, and removed to Northfield, Mass., from which place he removed to Walpole in the Spring of 1749.

He built himself a log hut near the mouth of Cold River, and in this he lived two years without seeing a single human being save his own family.
