

LOCAL PARAGRAPHS.

Among other business transacted, a charter was granted to the Port Blakely Lodge. At the Presbyterian Church today the Rev. John Hemphill, D. BIRTHDAY PARTY.—Mrs. Rebekah Wood, widow of ex-Governor Wood, of Ohio, celebrated the 81st anniversary of her birthday, about the 15th of May last, in Alameda, California, where she now resides with her daughter, Mrs. Mastick, wife of S. L. Mastick, owner of the Fort Discovery sawmill. At this birthday party one of the ladies present was 91 years of age, and the age of ten of the oldest ones present aggregated 728 years. Gov. Wood was well known in his time, and for many years was on the bench. During Buchanan's administration he was Consul-General to the Republic of Chile. He died in 1861, about the beginning of the war. Mrs. Wood is hale and hearty, and likely to celebrate many more anniversaries of her birth. The party was prepared by her daughter, and was a very happy affair.

FALSE ALARM.—About four o'clock yesterday morning a fire alarm was sounded, and many citizens of our town sprang from their beds only to find they had been duped. A meeting was called by the firemen to investigate the matter. From the statement of Mr. Jabe Haskell, one of the night watchmen, it appears that a man came running up to him and said there was a fire in the rear of Meydenbauer's store. Mr. H. ran to the engine house and sounded the alarm in good faith. A committee was appointed to wait on the Council at their special meeting Monday evening, and inform them of the result of their investigation and request that an ordinance be passed attaching a heavy penalty to anyone guilty of sounding a false fire alarm.

The main building will be 20x28 feet, two stories high, with an addition 14x20, one story high. Four men are now engaged on the new structure, which will be for rent when completed. IN PROBATE.—An order has been made appointing Moses R. Maddocks administrator of the estate of Horace W. Rowland, deceased. In the Putnam estate a petition has been filed for a tombstone, and in the Thomas Powers estate a petition has been filed for the appointment of an administrator. The final account of guardian of the Slater heirs was also filed.

RETURNED.—Messrs. O. Jacobs, Joseph McNaught and I. M. Hall and wife, returned from Leaconer on the same Chehalis yesterday. After the court adjournment these gentlemen had evidently gone on a hunting expedition, as Judge Jacobs brought home a fine large deer with him. SET ASIDE.—The will of George C. Fisher, deceased, contested by Miss Nell. Fisher, has been set aside by order of Judge Greene, on the ground of insanity of the testator at the time of its making.

EASTERN WASHINGTON.

Mrs. S. J. Moses is dressmaking in Colfax. The Register and Receiver of the Whittman Land Office has received a circular from the Commissioner of the General Land Office instructing them to allow 160 acres to be taken as a homestead within railroad limits, under the law approved March 3, 1879.

Near Colfax, on the 10th of May, Mr. and Mrs. A. Hammer lost their son Oscar, aged 7 years and 8 days; and on the 13th lost two younger sons, Ira of 1 year and 3 months, and Albert of 3 years and 15 days—all by diphtheria.

The Palouse Gazette furnishes us these personals of home interest: Col. D. P. Jenkins, of Seattle, is spending a few days in town, previous to going to Spokane Falls, where he will probably locate and practice his profession—law. Mr. Losh Harker, who has for a number of years been connected with Starr's line of steamers, of Puget Sound, is now on a tour of inspection through this country. He called on us the other day and said that he had almost made up his mind to settle in the Deep Creek country and engage in the business of raising horses.

BORN IN A HACK.—Mrs. Stepps, a Portland woman, was taken suddenly ill in the streets of Oregon's metropolis, last Thursday. A hack was quickly obtained for her by sympathizing bystanders, and she was sent to St. Vincent's Hospital. A police officer accompanied her, and on the way she screamed and acted outrageously; the worst part of her trouble arising from her own drunken condition. She had to be carried into the Hospital, where the Sisters of Mercy kindly assumed her care. Upon returning to the hack the officer heard hoarsely equals from the interior, and, on searching it, found lying on the floor a new-born baby crying loudly against the neglect he had experienced and the scantiness of his costume. He, too, was taken into the Hospital and cared for by the Sisters.

AN ANTICIPATED BURIAL.—On the last voyage of the steamer Alaska to China, one of her two hundred Chinese passengers died. A Portuguese stow-away was placed to watch the corpse, preparatory to its embalmment the following day. The watcher, probably disliking his task or believing in the doctrine that the Chinese must go, during the night threw the corpse overboard. The next morning, its loss becoming known, the Chinese passengers grew highly indignant and sought to catch the Portuguese and throw him after the body, but were prevented from doing so. The steamship Company will have a bill to pay for the non-fulfillment of their contract, which is that when a Chinese passenger dies on the voyage the body must be embalmed and taken to China for burial.—San Francisco Chronicle
