Fog On the Hudson River Caused A Disastrous Steamboat Collision At Half-past One This Morning

KINGSTON, N. Y., Oct. 12.—In a heavy fog which hung over the Hudson river, shutting out the view for more than a very short distance, the monster steamer, Adirondack, of the People's line, crashed into the Saratoga, of the Citizens' line, near Glasgow, at one-thirty this morning.

Several panic stricken passengers who jumped overboard were rescued by the crew of the steamer Troy, which was closely following and then stood by removing the passengers from the Saratoga, who were later landed at Tivoli.

Clarence Sherman, employed on the Saratoga, was killed instantly in the crash and head clerk, George Herton is missing. The accident occurred at a narrow part of the river. Both boats were bound up stream.
