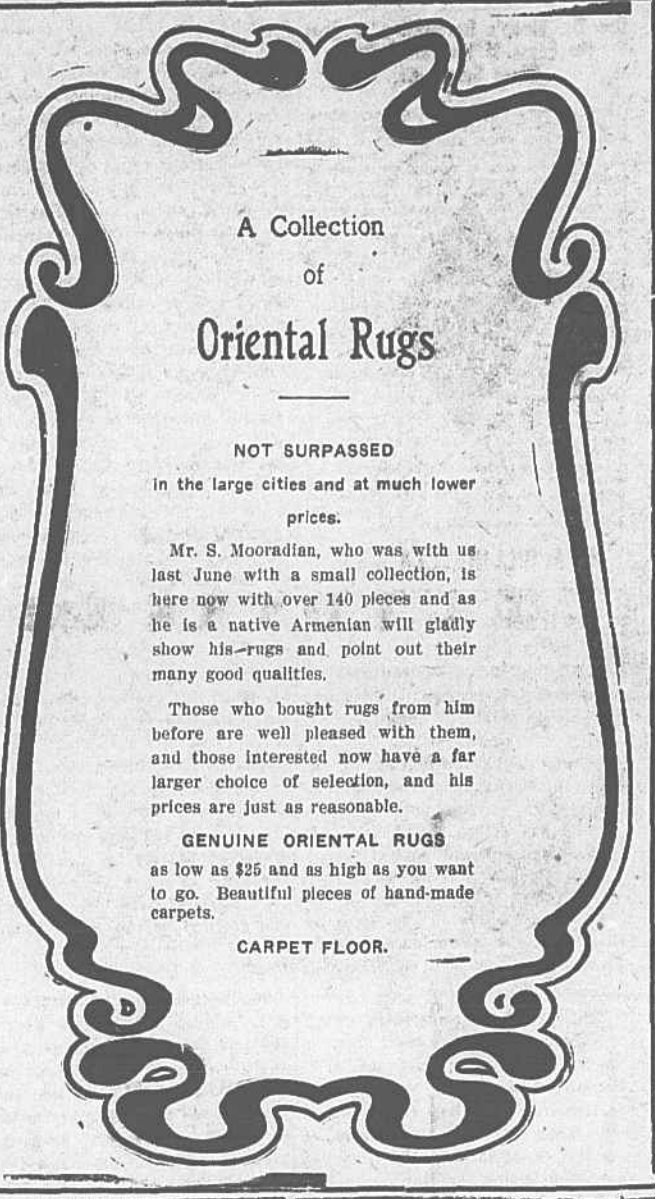

JAMESTOWN EXPOSITION NOTES.

The site of the original English settlement of Jamestown is forty miles up the James river from the Jamestown Exposition grounds. Boats will take visitors to the site twice a day.

The oldest tomb in St. Paul's church, Norfolk, Va., is that of Dorothy Farrell, who was buried there in 1673 just sixty-six years after the settlement at Jamestown in 1607. This church yard will be interesting to visitors to the Jamestown Exposition as it is one of the most ancient burying grounds in the United States.

Among the historical relics of greatest national interest that visitors to the Jamestown Exposition may see is the arm chair in which sat John Hancock when he signed the Declaration of Independence. It is of mahogany, upholstered in leather. It stands in the vestry of St. Paul's church in the city of Norfolk, and there it may be seen by all who visit that famous old church.

The State of California, too big to be left out of any exposition, is contemplating a vast exhibit of California's resources at the Jamestown Ter-Centennial. The fruits and minerals will be largely exploited, and the lumber interests will make a great display in the forestry building.

SAVED FROM GIBBET BY CHILDREN'S PRAYERS.

Convicted Murderer Gets Life Term Instead From Compassionate Judge.

CHICAGO, Oct. 15.—The prayers of his three little daughters saved Anthony Bemis, convicted wife murderer, from the gallows. In answer to the children's plea for Judge Kersten set aside the verdict recommending the death penalty and sentenced Bemis to imprisonment for life.

The first words of the sentence which would send the prisoner to the gibbet were forming on the Judge's lips, when Rose, the prisoner's 10-year-old daughter, burst into a child's appeal for her father's life. Her sisters, Sylvia and Mary, joined her while Bemis broke down and wept.

"I must grant these children's prayer," exclaimed the Judge. "Bemis was convicted on their stories alone when they might have refused to testify. Bemis, I will spare your life, but you must spend it in a cell."
