Plum Run Mine Is Still Idle. OFFICIALS HAVE DECIDED TO ALLOW WORKMEN TIME TO COOL OFF.

WHEELING, Oct. 18.—Secretary Patrick McBryde, of the Ohio operators, and President Andrew Watkins, of this sub-district of the Ohio district, of the U. M. W. of A., visited three mines Wednesday and adjusted slight differences.

The trouble at the Glenn's run mine over the discharge of a miner has not been settled. The miners seem to think the discharge was unjust, but the company considers its action justified under the scale agreement.

At Plum run, from information gained Wednesday by telephone, matters there are in statu quo. The miners are still obdurate and refuse to work under the present superintendent. The miners' officials are helpless from the fact that there is nothing to justify a strike under the scale, and the company has nothing to concede in either wages or conditions.

It was learned, unofficially, that General Superintendent Willard, of the United States Coal Company, and President Watkins, of the miners, have concluded to make no further attempt to reason with the miners this week, giving them a few days to cool off and take off the edge of their present temper.
