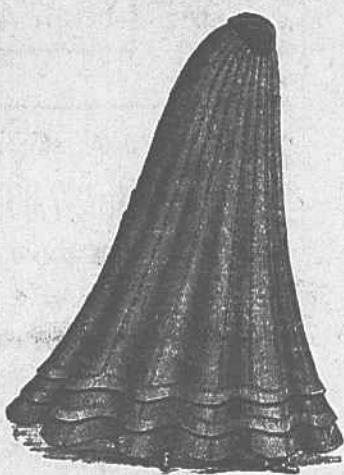

### VERY BRILLIANT EVENT.

#### Was Wedding of Mr. Lively and Miss DeBolt Last Night.

The Lively-DeBolt nuptials which were celebrated in Christ Church last evening and followed by a reception at the home of the bride's parents, was one of the most brilliant events that has been witnessed here for some time. The ceremony was performed at six o'clock in Christ Church and was witnessed by the intimate friends and relatives of the contracting parties. The interior of the church had been beautifully decorated for the event, green being the only color used in the scheme. The Rood Screen was interwined with boughs of laurel and the pulpit was banked in palms and ferns. Florist Ed. Hall had charge of the decorations. While the guests were being seated, Mrs. Warder Cresson rendered a number of selections on the organ, and as the hour set for the wedding arrived, the opening strains of the bridal song from "Lohengrin" were sounded, which was sung by Mrs. Dorsey E. Wiltshire, of Fairmont, led the bridal party and were followed by Mr. Charles Lively, of Weston, a brother of the groom, and Mr. Edward Holbert, of Fairmont. The four maids then entered, led by Miss Elsie Orcutt, of Baltimore, followed by Miss Jean Fleming, Miss Emily Lively, of Weston, a sister of the groom, and Miss Elizabeth Watson, all entering alone. Miss Lucy Haymond, as maid of honor, preceded the

bride, who entered with her father, Mr. George W. DeBolt. As the bride entered, the groom and his best man, Mr. Robert Koblegard, of Clarksburg, entered the pulpit by the vestry room and met the bride at the rood screen. Rev. Morton Barnes, pastor of Christ Church, performed the marriage ceremony. After the responses were made the bride party moved to the altar where the marriage vows were taken. As the party moved to the altar the song "O Perfect Love" was beautifully rendered by Mrs. Fitch. "Cupid's Garden" was rendered on the organ during the latter part of the ceremony and the party left the church to the strains of Mendelssohn's Reconciliation.  
 The bride wore a gown of radium silk over chifon and silk, en traine. She wore a bridal veil held by a spray of orange blossoms and carried a white prayer book. A brooch of diamonds and pearls, the gift of the groom, was her only ornament. Miss Haymond wore a gown of white chifon crepe and carried American Beauty roses. The bride's maids wore pale green princess gowns of green chifon voile trimmed in Irish lace. They carried large bunches of white chrysanthemums.  
 Mrs. DeBolt wore a gown of gray crepe de chene, cut low in the neck, with a border of real lace. At the church she wore a picture hat of black velvet.  
 After the wedding party left the church they were driven to the DeBolt home on First street and Virginia avenue, where from seven until ten a reception was held. A large number of invitations had been issued to the reception and during the hours the home was thronged with guests. Mr. and Mrs. DeBolt, the bride and groom and Miss Zeta Lively, of Weston, were in the receiving line, which was stationed at the doors between the reception hall and parlor. Mrs. Edw. Forrest Hartley invited the

guests to the dining room where an excellent luncheon was served by Caterer Kuhn, of Pittsburg. As the guests passed from the dining room, Mrs. George Watson Fleming presented the favors, which were artificial flowers filled with rice. In the reception room, Miss Mabel Morderwell served cognac, assisted by the young ladies of the bridal party. After the bride's cake was cut the ring was discovered by Miss Elizabeth Watson, the thimble by Miss Jean Fleming and the sixpence by Miss Elsie Orcutt. The interior of the DeBolt home was beautifully decorated for the event in autumn leaves and wood vines, and the serving table in the dining room was massed in white chrysanthemums and the glow from many green shaded candles fell softly over all.  
 The marriage of Miss DeBolt and Mr. Lively has been of unusual interest to Fairmont people owing to the prominence of both young people. Miss DeBolt is the only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. G. W. DeBolt and has resided in Fairmont since early childhood. She spent several years in eastern schools for girls and later spent a year abroad in a Paris school. She has also studied music in the University School of Music and is a member of the Kappa Delta Sorority. Mr. Lively is a graduate of the State University and for a number of years has successfully practiced law in this city. He is also prominent in military circles and is a lieutenant in the First regiment W. Va. National Guards. His home is in Weston. Mr. and Mrs. Lively will spend a couple of weeks in eastern cities and on their return will go to their new home on Fourth street.  
 Caterer Kuhn, of Pittsburg, who served the refreshments at the reception, labored under great disadvantages last night. By some unfortunate

mistake the special car which contained everything for serving, including the edibles, dishes, chairs, etc., was sent to Morgantown and did not get back here until half after seven o'clock. After the car finally did arrive the work of preparation which should have occupied hours had to be done in a very few minutes. It had been the intention to serve the bridal party immediately after their arrival from the church, but the delay made great changes in the plans. The mistake was certainly unfortunate, yet few people realized that there was anything wrong with the service.
