Annual Report of Treasurer Given

MONEY STOCK OF COUNTRY DURING THE YEAR SHOWS A GROWTH OF \$186,866,727.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31.—Charles H. Treat, treasurer of the United States, submitted his annual report to the secretary of the treasury yesterday and in reference to the more notable transactions said in part:

The net result of the ordinary revenues and expenditures for the fiscal year 1906 was a surplus of \$25,669,322 as compared with a deficit of \$23,004,228 for the preceding year.

The available cash balance on June 30, 1906, was \$180,689,854, an increase of \$35,211,862 as compared with that of twelve months earlier.

The monetary stock of the country took on a growth during the year of \$186,866,727, of which \$118,050,777 was in gold, \$5,450,396 in silver and \$65,392,554 in national bank notes, while the treasury notes decreased \$2,027,000.

The treasury holding of gold continues to attract the attention of financiers both at home and abroad. It is apparent from the continued accumulation that a large share of the product of the gold mines of the world is brought to the United States.

The pressure from bankers and holders for larger and more regular supply of small denominations of currency continues unabated, while the treasury is without resources for the issue of small bills to comply with their urgent requests.

PITTSBURG COAL COMPANY MAKES CHARGE OF FRAUD.

Alleges It Lost \$75,000 in Two Years in Dealings With Chicago Man.

CHICAGO, Oct. 31.—John H. Jones, of the Jones & Adams Coal Company, was charged by the Pittsburg Coal Company, in a bill filed in the Circuit Court, with fraudulent practice by which the Pittsburg company asserts, it has lost \$75,000.

Three years ago the Jones & Adams company sold their business to the Pittsburg company for \$650,000. Jones remained as president and general manager. Within two years the Pittsburg company says its losses were caused by Jones.

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To Soup House Days? If So Vote for Riley For Congress

NEW YORK, Oct. 31.—Evidence of the high state of prosperity throughout the country, especially in the manufacturing industries, was given in the announcement of the board of directors of the United States Steel Corporation at their quarterly meeting yesterday that orders on hand aggregated 7,936,894 tons, the largest in the history of the corporation.

The net earnings for the quarter were \$38,114,624, after deducting all expenses for repairs, renewals, interest on bonds and fixed charges. The surplus for the quarter was \$14,697,318, after the payment of 1 1/2 per cent on the preferred stock and another declaration of one-half of 1 per cent on the common stock.

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
